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## MARINE NEWS

The tern schooner Minus Prince, Capt. W. H. Smith, has arrived at Havana from Kingsport with potatoes. Annapolis Spectator: Three-masted scho. Souvenir, 31 tons, arrived December 23rd from Digby with fish and cleared same date in ballast for Tiverton.

Schooner Loran B. Snow will haul out on the slip at Yarmouth to complete the repairs to the damage which she sustained ten days ago while lying at her owner's wharf.

The four-masted auxiliary schooner Bessie A. White is on the passage from Turk's Island to Eastport, Me., with a cargo of salt. After discharging she will load lumber at Apple River for New York.

Gilbert's Cove, Dec. 28—The scho. Westway, Capt. George W. Brooks, sailed from Belliveau's Cove on the 27th for Boston with spruce lumber and harbored at Gilbert's Cove; wind N.W.W. with heavy vapor squalls.

Hants Journal: A miniature torpedo boat destroyer, self-propelled, electrical power, and made by "Doll" Burns, of Hantsport, is on exhibition in the window of Dimock & Armstrong, Water street. It is a clever piece of work and well worth seeing.

Saturday's Halifax Herald: On and after January 1st, the steamer Prince Albert will be temporarily taken out of the service between Kingsport, Parrishboro and Wolfville. It was announced yesterday at the Halifax office of the Dominion Atlantic Railway.

Captain Freeman Hatfield left Parrishboro on Wednesday for New York to take command of the tern schooner Burpee L. Tucker, which has been chartered to load hard pine at Mobile for Pointe a Pitre. Captain Stewart T. Salter, who has had charge of the vessel for a trip, will return home.

The C. G. S. Arras, Captain Barhouse is now making her headquarters at Canso, to remain until the winter fishing season comes to an end, to be ready to assist any of the fleet that may require it, during the very uncertain and risky weather conditions under which operations offshore are now carried on.

The schooner Nevis, Capt. R. J. Anthony, master, arrived in Bear River from Boston, Tuesday, December 20th, bringing fertilizer for the Bear River Trading Co. On the passage the mate, John Curtis, fell overboard. Only for the valuable assistance given by another vessel, which was closely following, he would have been drowned.

Yarmouth Telegram: The Halifax tern scho. Chas. F. Gordon, Capt. J. G. Bowyer, sailed on Wednesday afternoon for Lunenburg. As the vessel passed out of the Sound with all sail set she presented, in the strong westerly wind which prevailed, a very pretty marine picture, while as she heeled over to the breeze and bore away on a southwesterly course to clear Cape Sable, showed, although sailing light, good speed.

The Weymouth two-masted schooner Laura Marlon, Captain William Trahan, of Belliveau's Cove, master, has arrived at Halifax from Little River, Digby County, with a cargo of 50 tons of ice. The 53-ton schooner is probably one of the oldest in the coastwise trade at this end of the province and was built in Bristol, Me., in 1867. Notwithstanding these years, however, she is, in her trim upkeep, apparently as able as many vessels of more recent construction and quite able to breast the elements for many years to come.

SUGAR TAKES DROP OF 10 CENTS

(Saturday's Halifax Herald)

Sugar prices took a drop yesterday of ten cents and the price to the retailer will now be \$7.60 per hundred weight, according to information received from local dealers. Asked what contributed to the decline one dealer said it was the natural course of events.

Prices should be lower, he said, considering that in the United States, where it is bought in the raw estate at the same price as in Canada and the cost of refining no greater, its price is from one to two cents lower.

It seems to be the impression in the local trade circles that refiners are holding the price up hoping to retrieve some of the lost profits occasioned by the great reduction some time ago when the government forced them to lower prices.

The cut has been effective all over Canada, but to a greater extent in other places, reaching as high as 25 cents on the Pacific coast.
