CHURCH UNION GREAT SUCCESS

Dr. Armstrong Tells Methodist Conference How United Effort Works in Bridgetown

"Co-operation in Church Work" was the subject of a short address delivered at the Thursday evening session of the Methodist Conference by Dr. M. E. Armstrong, and Dr. Armstrong's terse, pithy discussion of this question was one of the most effective speeches of the sessions so far.

Dr. Armstrong spoke as a layman from a town where the Presbyterians and Methodists have a Union Church under a section of the Methodist Discipline providing for co-operative effort.

DUPLICATION OF EFFORT After referring to the waste of energy and money through duplication of church effort in many communities—a condition due in part to inheritances from the past—Dr. Armstrong declared that the endeavor should be to have one church in each community, manned by a resident minister, "and then, and not till then, can be hope to do the work that the church should be doing."
