Mrs. Robert Laird Borden is already well known, as, like Lady Laurier, she has made it a point whenever possible to travel about with her husband on his political tours, and ever her tact and charming personality have won many friends, not only for herself, but for her husband and his party. For she has always taken the keenest interest in his work, his lifework she has made hers also, his career has been her highest aim, and to his success she has contributed in no small degree. One may well be sure that no brusque speech, no un-gracious bearing on her part will put difficulties in the party's way, or alienate from her husband any wavering supporter. She has been a helpmeet in the truest sense, and in many ways. For instance, she has the faculty of seldom forgetting a face. Now, as often happens with men who are burdened by the cares of a nation, the new Prime Minister is a trifle absent-minded, and often when greeting strangers Mrs. Borden will turn to her husband with "Oh, Rob! this is Mr. So-and-So; you remember we met him at such a place."


