Several officers on board the steam launch of H.M.S. They consisted of the chief and representative men of the four bands, storm, and demanded something to eat, he demurred, but finally gave them a bag of flour. They then went to Col. Houghton, and Major Boulton arrived here on Tuesday he took them to the H. B. store and made them presents of flour, bacon, tea, &c. Some of the volunteer: were scared lest they were on the war path and were preparing for an encounter. The next day they again interviewed Col. Houghton, Mr. Drever acting as interpreter, and they got more presents.


