 Easter vestry meetings were held both at St. Mark's and at St. Mary's Churches the first week in April. At St. Mark's Messre. Stevens and Unite k were appointed church-wardens for the ensuing year, and at St. Mary's Messrs. H. M. Rogers and H. Ruchle. Church committees also were appointed to assist the church-wardens in their work, and to meet four times in the year. St. Mark's financial report showed \$171.35 contributed towards minister's stipend, and \$18.70 to the mission fund. There was also raised, partly by subscription and partly by an entertainment, the sum of \$63 65 as a "general purposes fund." Out of this was paid \$10 for insurance, \$10 Synod assessment, \$10 sexton, and \$25 cost of the new porch. St. Mary's financial report showed muniter's supend \$1. mission fund, \$1; general purposes fund, \$16. This latter was to meet the debt on the church, and also to provide cocounut matting for the aisle. There is one subscription of \$20 (Mr. George Furness) due on St. Mary's building account. When that is paid there will be a little balance to the good for further improvements. Mr Wilson reported that during the year he had held 104 Sunday services, 32 work-day services, had paid 581 visits, and travelled (on the Island) 2,292 miles. There had been 9 births, 11 baptisms, I marriage, 4 deaths, and 9 persons had been confirmed.
