Add four hard-boiled eggs, slice and thoroughly mix with the other ingredients. For dressing, put in a saucepan a pint of rinegar together with a lump of sugar the size of an egg. Beat three eggs with two tablespoonfuls of mustard, one of black pepper, two of sugar, and one tend shalls of salt. When theroughly bearen gether, pour slowly into the vinegar until it thickens. Be careful not to cook too long or the eggs will civile. Remove from the fire, and when cold pour over the salad. The salad may be made the day before the dressing. Add the dressing just before serving. Add lemon juice to improve the flavour, and garnish the top with slices of lemon.


