Mr. MacInnis: On a point of order, Mr. Speaker, with regard to the ruling that you have just made about members of the opposition asking members of the government for opinions, does that same ruling not apply to the government when members of the opposition ask questions and the Prime Minister and other ministers get up and give opinions?

Mr. Speaker: It applies to all members.
