SLOWDOWN BY GROUND PERSONNEL—ASSURANCE OF NO DISRUPTION OF PASSENGER SERVICE DURING CHRISTMAS HOLIDAYS

Mr. Lincoln M. Alexander (Hamilton West): Mr. Speaker, I should like to direct a question to the Prime Minister regarding the Air Canada slowdown. In view of the initiation of a work to rule campaign by ground personnel of Air Canada, can the Prime Minister inform the House whether the government has been assured there will be no major disruptions of passenger service during the Christmas holidays and, if not, are measures being undertaken so that such an assurance can be given in the next few days?

Hon. Bryce Mackasey (Minister of Labour): Mr. Speaker, I am not sure that the hon. gentleman who is an industrial relations critic, is suggesting that I should bring in emergency legislation to remove from the workers their right to strike if that right becomes legal during the Christmas holidays. I have made it clear in television interviews that I think work to rule is self-defeating and I would suggest to the union members that they drop these tactics between now and the time the conciliation report is made public.

Mr. Alexander: I wonder whether the Minister of Labour can assure the House that there will be no major disruptions over the Christmas holidays? I think that is the important point.

Mr. Mackasey: Mr. Speaker, the only way I can give that assurance is to take away from Canadian workers precisely what they are entitled to under the law of the land.

Mr. Speaker: Order. This is becoming a debate between the minister and the hon. member.
