10TH REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC ACCOUNTS

Mr. Len Hopkins (Renfrew-Nipissing-Pembroke): Madam Speaker, I have the honour to present the 10th report of the Standing Committee on Public Accounts and in doing so, I would like to make the following remarks.

The tenth report of the Standing Committee on Public Accounts which I have the honour to table today deals with the problems encountered by the Canadian Coast Guard and the Department of the Transport in the modernization of a large ice-breaker, the *Louis St. Laurent*.

The modernization project has gone through a rapid cost escalation, including a major cost overrun, from a planned expenditure of \$51 million to a projected \$139

million and is some 20 months behind schedule. The project was not let out to tender at Cabinet request. The committee has tried to put these problems in perspective and examine the larger questions of improved planning and reporting of major capital projects in Transport Canada and in other government departments.

For example, Transport Canada has agreed that a more thorough assessment process is required prior to all future ship modernizations or major repairs and the committee has made a recommendation to this effect.

With respect to non-tendering, the committee repeated an important recommendation made in several earlier reports to the House, namely that maximum use be made of competitive tendering for contracts.

The committee has asked Transport Canada to respond to the recommendations by June 28, 1991 and has requested a government response to two of the recommendations at an earlier date pursuant to Standing Order 109.
