tury ago. The toil which has produced so notable a work must have been immense, and entitles the authoress to the gratitude of her fellow Canadians. Miss Carnochan has long been famous for devotion to tasks of this kind. The transactions of the Niagara Historical Society bear evidence to her zeal in the cause of original research. The establishment of the unique Historical Museum in the town is due to her indomitable enterprise and owes much to her generosity and unselfishness. These and similar achievements, proofs of a practical patriotism all too rare. are now capped by the History of Niagara, which is a timely contribution to our scanty knowledge of bygone days. It is to be hoped that the book will find many readers, both on account of its merits and as a slight recognition of the labours of its gifted authoress.
