When the city, has been thoroly canvassed, copies of the petition will be sent to moving picture manufacturers here and in the States.


GALT BAND'S NEW LEADER

GIVEN A CONVENT WOMEN NOW ACTIVE IN SPANISH POLITICS

MADRID. Spain. March 24.—For the first time Spanish women have entered the domain of politics. A large number of aristocratic ladies, headed by the Duchess de Lima and the Duchess de Solomayor, waited upon Premier Romanones and protested earnestly against the government's declared intention to abolish obligatory religious teaching in school and omit the reading of the church catechism. The premier declined to alter an important government bolicy, but he showed his goodwill toward his fair potitioners by promising that the cruciffx shall not be removed from the schools while he is head of the cabinet.

MORE FIGHTING IN MEXICO.

MONTEREY, Mex., March 24.—(Can. Press.)—The rebels, who were repulsed in their recent attack on Saltillo, are now fortified at the Town of Paredon, to the west of Monterey. They utilized trains in their retreat from Saltillo.

The government has despatched troops from both Saltillo and Monterey to engage the rebels in their new positions.

STROPSIS OF DOMINION LAND REGULATIONS

ANY person who is the sole head of 2 family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, or certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homestcader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A bomesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain district certain districts a homesteader in

good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the home-Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in
each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and
