

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH.

The sole head of a family, or any mail The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions. conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine mlies of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the violative.

cept where residence is performed in the violity.

In certain districts a homesteader 'n good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also fifty acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his beautiful control of the conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per
acre. Duties—Must reside six months in
each of the three years, cultivate fifty
acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to
reduction in case of rough, scrubby or
stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
