Lord Camelford received the first rudiments of his education at Berne in Switzerland, which he afterwards compleated at Charter-houfe School. When very young his Lordthip engaged himfelf in the fervice of his country, and in rotation ferved the regular periods. His conduct, while in a flate of probation for future honours, was fuch as to warrant a well-founded opinion of his gallantry and bravery, at the fame period that his eccentricities exposed him to repeated difadvantages, without any cvil intentions, through the natural impetuofity of his temper, joined to his very high fentiments of honour, he involved himfelf in a variety of disputes, and in some cases with those, whose superior years and rank in their country's fervice did not justify fuch proceedings. At the fame period it is equally true, that ea many occasions a knowledge of his irritability has frequently induced unthinking perfons to offer affronts which they well knew his Lordthip neither could or would fubmit to; and it is a queftion which deferves the most ferious confideration, whether knowing his habitual failing it would not have reflected more honour to themfelves to have flightly paffed over, or neglected to take notice of his momentary patlion, than by a contrary conduct compel him, in vindication of his own honour, to have recourfe to a mode of conduct which, in his cooler moments, he condemned.

At an early age his Lordthip entered into the naval fervice of his country; and under the command of Captain Vancouver, of his Majefty's thip Difeovery, failed round the world: and there cannot exift a doubt, that if his Lordthip could have conquered that irritability of temper, which involved him in fuch a variety of difputes, and ultimately ended in his death, he would have attained the higheft naval honours. Unfortunately fuch was the violence of his temper, that on many occations he totally forgot what was due to his rank, and in the moments of pallion had recourfe to the moft violent meafures.
