DISCHARGED EMPLOYEES BECOME TRAIN WRECKERS

Police Make Serious Allegations as to Cause of Fatal Accident.

BERLIN, Sept. 4.—The Prussian railway administration has offered a reward for the discovery of the person who wrecked the St. Petersburg-Berlin express, between Strausberg and Rehfeld, near Berlin, shortly before midnight, resulting in 11 persons being injured.

The police investigation throws suspicion on discharged railroad men, who thus sought to avenge their dismissal. The train was derailed, several cars were telescoped and afterwards caught fire. An examination of the scene of the wreck at daylight showed that the bolts had been removed from the flanges of a 50-foot rail, resulting in the latter becoming derailed after the locomotive had passed over it.

The persons injured were mostly inhabitants of Berlin, postal clerks, commercial travelers and two army officers. It does not appear that any Russian of high rank was a passenger on the train, but the Grand Duke Nicholas Nicolaevitch, with a staff of six officers, is expected to arrive here to-morrow, on his way to the German army manoeuvres, when he will be the guest of Emperor William.

The officials of the Prussian railways are unusually alert at present owing to the frequent accidents which have recently occurred.

THE TARIFF WITH FRANCE.

Business Circles Are Highly Satisfied With the Arrangement.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) LONDON, Sept. 4.—The Times, referring to the Franco-Canadian negotiations, states that France has successfully sought to obtain from Canada not only the benefit of the minimum tariff, but in the case of certain articles an important reduction in duties, notably in wine. France extended the application of her minimum tariff to the number of exclusively Canadian products.

Lively satisfaction is felt in French business circles at the conclusion of the agreement. One journal points out that French diplomacy has given a most practical reply to the initiative of Canadians in establishing a regular steamship line from the St. Lawrence to the Seine.
