**Chinese Exiles in Turkestan.**

Peking, June 28.—Word has been received here of the arrival of Duke Lunzhi, Chinese minister to the United States, in Turkestan, in which place of banishment they have been sentenced to reside. How long they will be there is not clear, but it appears to have been an error of calculation at Peking in the first place by those making up the indemnities, and later by the Chinese in their hasty acceptance of the total. As finally made up, this total was \$50,000,000 taels, but the present calculation, after taking in all of the demands that are known, makes the total only \$45,000,000 taels. In the meantime, China has agreed to pay the larger amount, so that the question now arises what will become of the excess of \$5,000,000 taels.

Another question which has arisen in this connection is as to the amount of the bonds which should be issued to Japan, as that country has drawn attention to the fact that its share of indemnity cannot be negotiated on as favorable terms as some of the powers can make. It is understood that the matter has been considered of sufficient importance to bring to the attention of the President, with a view to learning the general attitude of this government on the matter.

**WOMEN FAINT AT FETE.**

Duchess of Sutherland's Crowd Said to Have Been a Vulgar, Snobbish Mob.

Philadelphia, June 28.—The North American's London correspondent writes: The eagerly-anticipated lifeboat fete at the Duchess of Sutherland's magnificent palace, Stafford House, Wednesday, brought a great deal of money for the charitable purpose intended, but as a social event it can best be described as a vulgar, snobbish mob.

English tourists who have been entertained at the Senatorial residences in Washington have sneered at the vulgar and snobbish nature of the party, and the Duchess of Sutherland's crowd, who were also so entertained and snobbish, but the worst pictures they have painted could not describe the scene at Stafford House to-night.

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**MANCHESTER'S FINAL APPEARANCE.**

Conditors Accept 12 Shillings and 6 Pence on the Pound—Says He Did Not Gamble.

London, June 28.—The Duke of Manchester made today what he hopes will be his last appearance in the Bankruptcy Court, as his creditors formally accepted the composition of 12 shillings and 6 pence in the pound, which offer was approved yesterday at a meeting of the unsecured creditors. Although the accounts showed that the unsecured debt amounted to £20,714, the trustees submitted that this sum could be scaled down to £10,704.

During the course of his final examination, the Duke of Manchester reiterated that his failure was due to the loss of several thousands of pounds in the purchase of the steamer which he had not gambled.

Miss Fortis Knight, the American secretary who has brought suit against the Duke of Manchester for breach of the fete, and others may change his imperfections to the presence of so many Americans, for the number of these latter exceeded all expectations.

**TRIAL OF EARL RUSSELL.**

Committee of Peers Appointed by the House of Lords to Deal With Bigamy Charge.

London, June 28.—At a special meeting of the House of Lords to-day a committee was appointed to arrange the procedure to bring Earl Russell, recently committed for trial at the old Bailey, on the charge of bigamy, to a speedy trial by his peers. The committee includes the Lord Chancellor, Lord Halsbury, the Lord Privy Seal, Lord Salisbury, and twelve other peers.

**YERKES COMES OUT ON TOP.**

After a Good Deal of Controversy He Gets the Job of Electrifying London Underground.

London, June 28.—The Parliamentary Committee, having the matter in charge, was again occupied to-day with the question of electrification of the underground railways, as the companies are unable to settle their differences as to whether the Yerkes or Ganz system shall be installed. The committee eventually decided that the Board of Trade should appoint an arbitrator to determine which system shall be adopted.

The committee subsequently approved the legislation proposed to enable Charles T. Yerkes to electrify the roads subject to the decision of the arbitrator and the engineers appointed by the respective railroads in regard to the system to be installed.

**ALONG THE WATERFRONT.**

There was an unprecedented rush on the boats yesterday, the business being the people to the waterfront in thousands. The crowd altogether ruined the splendid social decorations, which cost thousands of pounds, and which were the result of the great features of the fete. The struggle at the buffets would have been a big portion of the business they lost during the earlier part of the season.

**MUST KEEP CLEAR OF POLITICS.**

Catholic Religious Processions in Spain Will Be Prohibited if They Are Non-Political.

Madrid, June 28.—The discussion of the religious processions in Spain led to such a tumult in the Chamber of Deputies last night that the sitting had been adjourned. Senor Silveira led the attack upon the government, but his remarks were drowned in a storm of Republican hisses and protests. The Minister of Interior, Senor Moragas, promised to protect Catholic religious demonstrations so long as they were not of a political character.

Later it was announced that Senor Arriola had resigned the presidency of the Chamber. He will probably be succeeded by Senor Canalejas.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs, the Duke of Almodovar, is expected to resign, in which case it is believed he will be replaced by Senor Moret.

Woodruff, Pierre Loti and J. B. Salsomali, who has been Ambassador Choate's private secretary, and who is succeeded to-day by W. Woodruff.
