FURTHER ADDITIONS TO THE RANKS Pianomakers on Strike Will Get First Allowance To-Day.

This morning will see further additions to the ranks of the piano workers who are out on strike. Yesterday afternoon the Executive Committee of the Strike Committee waited on the men who are working that they will go out to-day. They number 14 men, who, when the strike was called, were hot members of the union. They will become union men to-day. Samuel Moore, chairman of the Strike Committee, received a communication last night that the foremen of two big factories will be with the strikers on Monday next, making a further addition of six men.

The strike has been on a week to-day. A communication from the General Council of the Amalgamated Wood Workers' Union at Chicago, Ill., received yesterday, stated that to-day the men will receive their first strike allowance. Each man will get \$7. The strikers are hopeful of winning the fight and claim that up to the present there has not been a single break in the

fight and claim that up to the present there has not been a single break in the ranks.

At the meeting held yesterday morning in Cameron Hall, 498 men were present. Routine business was transacted and reports from pickets received. It was reported that the manager and foreman of one large firm waited on a number of the improvers and apprentices on Tuesday last and tried to induce them to return to work. The men and boys waited on refused to return to work, however.

The men have not as yet settled with the Prince Plano Company, but it is expected that an agreement with this firm will be arrived at at an early date. A general meeting of the strikers will be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock in Cameron Hall.

The manufacturers held another meeting yesterday afternoon and discussed the situation. The various factories are open and the employes claim that they have a number of men at work. In the meantime they are busy taking stock.

It will be interesting to the public to know what the various branches of the trade are demanding. The scale, as requested, will range from 20 to 30 cents an hour. The machine hands demand 20 to 25 cents; sounding board workers, 27½ cents; veneerers, 27½ cents; action makers and regulators, 30 cents; case and fly finishers, 27½ cents; grainers and floorers, 30 cents; varnishers, rubbers and pollshers, 25 cents.
