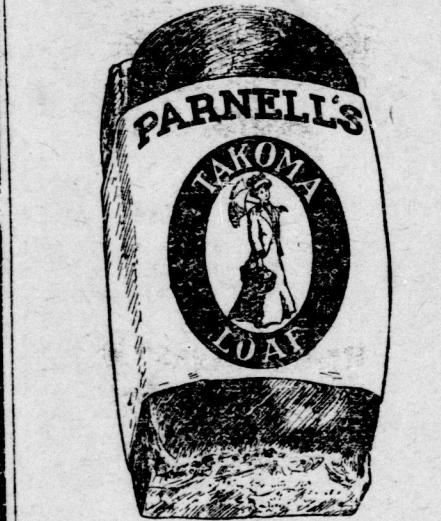

The Hamilton Herald says of the Kelly-Lawson wedding: A wedding of considerable local interest took place in London yesterday, when Thomas Kelly, of the office staff of the light and power department of the Cataract Power Company, was married to Miss Margaret Lawson, daughter of John Lawson, Euclid avenue, London. The ceremony was performed at the residence of the bride's parents, and was attended by a number of relative and friends of the groom in this city. Rev. Dean Davis officiated, and the happy couple were attended to in anticipation of the happy event the members of the office staff of the Cataract Power Company presented to Mr. Kelly a handsome dining-room table on Saturday.

A Bennett Act.

While Mlle. Carlotta was doing the sensational turn of looping the loop in Bennett's Theater, Hamilton, yesterday afternoon, there was just as thrilling an act going on outside the theater. Two painters, employed by the contractor, were at work on a scaffold 30 or 40 feet from the ground, and they got into an altercation. It is alleged one tried to throw the other to the ground, which would likely have meant death. The man held to the scaffold for dear life, till Mr. R. St. John went up his ladder to his assistance. The men were separated, one being sent to another place to work.

An Industrial Problem.

Brantford has a peculiar problem in the industrial line. A Jewish company, employing 50 Jews, has purchased a large building on Dalhousie street, in a residential section, and is maintaining a rag and metal concern. It is now seeking the right to have a railway switch in its premises. Citizens, in asking the city council to refuse the privilege, are arguing against the business, not the switch. The council takes the stand that the business is legitimate and that as the switch will be an aid to it, it should be granted, provided the company meets property damages, which it has agreed to do.

Special Delivery Letters.

The postoffice department has considerably extended the special delivery list of postoffices, so that special delivery letters can now be sent to the following places: Halifax, St. John, Fredericton, Quebec, Sherbrooke, St. Hyacinthe, Three Rivers, Montreal, Kingston, Peterboro, Toronto, Hamilton, Guelph, Brantford, Berlin, Stratford, London, Windsor, Calgary, Winnipeg, Edmonton, Vancouver, Victoria.

The special delivery stamp, costing ten cents in addition to the ordinary postage, will insure special delivery in usually 15 or 20 minutes after the letter reaches its postoffice of destination. The special delivery hours are between 7:00 a.m. and 10 p.m. on week days, but special deliveries are not made on Sundays. Drop letters for special local delivery, if bearing the extra ten cents, besides ordinary postage, and marked special delivery, will be also dealt with as express letters, and delivered with promptness. It is better to use special delivery stamps, but where that is not practicable, if the extra ten cents (in addition to ordinary postage) is affixed in ordinary stamps, the letter will be forwarded for special delivery; but in that case the words "Special delivery" should be marked on the letter. The system of special delivery letters is growing in popularity with the public judging from the experience of the London postoffice.
