With the American Army in France. 17.—(By the Associated Press.) The Germans opposite the American sector, northwest of Toul, are resorting to infernal machines in an effort to check the activity of the American patrols, numbers of which go out ever patrols, numbers of which go out every night to roam "no man's land" and even German land virtually at will.

A member of an American patrol stepped on a harmless looking wire near the German lines early yesterday and a bomb immediately exploded in the centre of the patrol group. It had been planted by the enemy.

The members of the patrol either entered or were assisted into an alternative. tered or were assisted into an alt doned trench nearby, and the soldiers prepared for a fight, believing one was certain to come. They walted in the darkness for half an hour for something to happen, but the Germans did come. The party then returned back the American line.
