70,000 ARMENIANS IN ADANA ARE FACING STARVATION; CITY IS CUT OFF BY TURKISH NATIONALISTS

Bonar Law, in Reply to Question in House of Commons As To Britain's Attitude, Declares That There Is a Limit To Intervention by British—The French Government Is Aware of Situation.

London, July 28.—The city of Adana in Asia-Minor, with a population of 70,000 Christians and 10,000 Moslems, is entirely cut off from the outside world by the Turkish Nationalists, and is on the verge of starvation, according to an official dispatch received by the Armenian bureau from Larnaca, Cyprus, under Saturday's date.

The dispatch says the city has food for only a few days and that communication is impossible except by aeroplane.

This dispatch was called to the attention of the House of Commons today, Mr. Bonar Law replying to questions, said the government's latest information was that Adana was very hard pressed, but he pointed out that Adana was in the French zone, and that the French were alive to the situation. He added that the British were very sympathetic to the Armenians,

GREEKS CARRYING ON BLOODLESS WAR AGAINST TURKS

Athens, July 28.—Greek military operations have been relatively bloodless, but successful, because of the rapidity of the Greek movement. They seem to appear at the right time and place with overwhelming force, and the morale of the Turks to break both in the Asia-Minor and Thracian campaigns.

When the Greeks departed at Iodosto a week ago, the soldiers throwing themselves into the sea and the Turkish commander at Adrianople, Col. Jafar Tatar, "I cannot hold out. My soldiers are running away like chickens."

Greek troops operating in Thrace total 50,000. Those in the Asia-Minor are 100,000. They are well equipped and experienced soldiers. It is estimated there were as few as 100 casualties among the Turks and Greeks in Thrace, but a few thousand have been reported in the Asia-Minor campaign.

RIVER WATER MAY BE USED IF CHLORINATED

North Branch Supply Better Than South, Says Dr. Hill.

That properly chlorinated and filtered water of the north branch of the Thames could be safely used to supplement London's supply of spring water, is the opinion of Dr. H. Hill, recently returned as head of the London Institute of Public Health.

TASCHEREAU REGRETS QUEBEC'S ISOLATION

Premier Says That Present Condition Should Be Remedied.

Quebec, July 28.—Discussing Quebec's position in Canadian affairs at the banquet tendered him by his supporters at the Chateau Frontenac last night, the premier, Mr. Taschereau, said: "Since Quebec is so necessary to confederation, it is not deplorable to note its isolation from the federal arena."

CANADA TO HAVE GOOD CROPS IF FAVORABLE WEATHER PREVAILS

New York, July 28.—(By The Canadian Press).—The Wall Street Journal this morning prints a summary of crop conditions in Canada taken from a report issued by the Canadian Bank of Commerce and adds this comment: "There has been considerable contraction and conflict in the crop reports coming out of Canada this season. But, reading this report of the bank, in connection with the bureau of statistics, extent of acreage, the official reports of the provinces, and those of at least one reliable crop expert, in connection with the news of good rains, Canada seems assured a large production of crops provided there may be a few weeks of fairly favorable weather. The condition thus far is unusually good."

CANADIAN TEACHERS TO ASK FOR DOUBLE AMOUNT PAID IN 1914

Calgary, July 28.—The newly-organized Canada Teachers' Federation has decided, by unanimous vote, to inaugurate a campaign to double the 1914 basis of salaries for teachers. Agreement that there shall be no underbidding by Ontario teachers was given by Miss Arbuthnot of Toronto.

MINISTER MAY LAY A CHARGE AGAINST SANDWICH CONSTABLE

Windsor, July 28.—Subsection A of section 84 of the Ontario Temperance Act reads: "Every inspector, policeman, or constable, neglecting or refusing to carry out and enforce the act shall incur a penalty of \$10 and may be summarily dismissed from office."

MAJOR LITTLE NEARLY KILLED

Unknown Speeder Crashed Into His Car On Springbank Road.

County police are endeavoring to locate the driver of an automobile which struck Major Little's car on the north Springbank road Monday night. The city's chief magistrate, Mr. Little, escaped from death, according to reports of the occurrence, and his car was wrecked.

NEW ENGLAND STATES TO GET 1,250,000 TONS MONTH TO AVERT FUEL FAMINE

Washington, July 28.—Adequate orders have been issued, members of the interstate commerce commission believe, to day to relieve the coal shortage in New England. Beginning next Monday, under priority orders, 1,250,000 tons of coal will be shipped to New England.

MANITOBA MAY HAVE FARMER-INDEPENDENT POLITICAL PARTY

Winnipeg, July 28.—After a conference lasting several hours yesterday, which was attended by the farmer and independent members elected to the Manitoba Legislature and labor members with defined Conservative affiliations in the past, the only announcement made was that a chairman and secretary had been elected, and that another meeting would be held on August 13. The announcement was made by A. R. Bolven, who stated that the conference had decided definitely to go into special session with the independent party in the Legislative Assembly, he did not say.

PROTEST TO JAPAN AS RESULT OF DECISION TO OCCUPY SAGHALIN

Tokio, July 28.—(By The Associated Press).—According to the Nichi Nichi, the Japanese Government has received an inquiry parading of the "nature of a protest, from a certain country," in connection with Japan's intention to occupy Saghalin, Manchuria, and other islands in the Khabarovsk and elsewhere.

SYRIAN GOVERNMENT ACCEPTS ALL TERMS

Beirut, Syria, July 28.—The French entry into Damascus, effected on Sunday, was marked by acceptance on the part of the new Syrian Government of the conditions laid down by Gen. Gouraud, the French commander. Involving chiefly immediate disarmament and the end of the reign of Prince Feisal, who has been invited to leave the country.

5,000 MEN IDLE DUE TO FUEL SHORTAGE

Gary, Ind., July 28.—As a result of the fuel shortage, 5,000 men here are idle, it was reported today. One big plant is out of commission, and several others are operating only intermittently.

Gram of Radium Valued at \$120,000 Will Be Used In Cancer Research

Washington, July 28.—One gram of radium, valued at \$120,000, but sealed in a tiny lead tube for use in cancer research, was delivered yesterday by the United States Bureau of Standards to Arthur H. Compton, a representative of the New York State Institute for Malignant Diseases.

AUSTRALIANS ENTER PROTEST WITH VATICAN AS RESULT OF ARCHBISHOP MANNIX'S VIEWS

Rome, July 28.—Strong remonstrances from Australia on the utterances in the United States of Archbishop Daniel J. Mannix of Melbourne, have been received by the Vatican. The protests state that the archbishop's assertions do not represent the feeling prevalent in Australia, and ask that some tangible public declaration be made in order to protect the loyalty of the large majority of the Australian population.

RISQUE JOKES MAY SEND 2,000 BACK TO SCHOOL

Censorship Will Be Extended To Vaudeville Stage Shortly.

London's board of education may face the task of accommodating 2,000 pupils that expected in September, if assent is given to the adolescent school act before that time. No official notice has been given by the board, but the general belief is that the act will come into force soon.

MURDER VICTIM WILL BE BURIED IN POTTER'S FIELD IN NEW YORK

New York, July 28.—Mrs. Leo Trumbull, wife of a Detroit policeman, today at the Bellevue morgue identified the body of the young woman found in a trunk in the American Railway Express warehouse last week, as that of Mrs. Eugene Leroy.

RICHARD SANDERS IS ASSISTANT INSPECTOR

Appointment Has Been Approved by the Board of Health.

Increased activity in sanitary inspection of the city is being shown by the board of health and Richard Sanders has been appointed assistant sanitary inspector in order that the work may be carried out more efficiently. His appointment has been considered for some time, and has now been finally approved by the board.

GUARDMEN ON WAY TO COAL MINES TO QUELL DISORDERS

Frankfort, Ky., July 28.—Twenty-five Kentucky State guardsmen under command of Capt. G. M. Kennedy, are on their way to the Kentucky-West Virginia border, where disorders have occurred recently.

I. F. HELLMUTH TO BE CHIEF COUNSEL

Toronto, July 28.—It is announced officially today that I. F. Hellmuth, K.C., will be chief counsel for the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission in the inquiry before the Sutherland royal commission on hydro radicals in Ontario. It is expected that Kenneth B. MacLaren, returned officer of the 10th Battalion, C.E.F., will be appointed secretary of the royal commission.

OVERSEAS DELEGATES APPRECIATE HEARTY WELCOME AT HALIFAX

Lord Burnham Declares British Editors Delighted With Visit.

SEE FOR THEMSELVES

Dominion's Glories Have Too Long Been Overlooked, Says Chairman.

Halifax, July 28.—By the Canadian Press.—We have come to appreciate speaking today ahead of Europe, but she is thinking and speaking for herself, said Lord Burnham today, in acknowledging the welcome Halifax and the overseas delegates to the Imperial Press Conference.

Speaking in the historic legislative chambers of the House, Lord Burnham declared that the overseas delegates had come to see Canada for themselves, and were convinced that they would not go away disappointed. To the Maritime Provinces he suggested that it was not true so much that Europe and the press had overlooked them to the benefit of other parts of the Dominion, but that the people of the Maritime Provinces had overlooked themselves, not doing themselves justice in the eyes of those Europeans who would like to make their homes and interests in Canada.

LIBERAL VICTORY IN NOVA SCOTIA WAS EXPECTED

Political Leaders At Ottawa Not Much Surprised.

FARMERS SUCCESSFUL

Hon. F. B. McCurdy To Contest Seat Where Agriculturalists' Candidate Won.

Ottawa, July 28.—Canadian Press.—Election returns from Nova Scotia have not occasioned much surprise at the federal capital. The return to power of the Murrays Government was expected by practically all the political pundits, but the results in some constituencies occasioned surprise. The surprise included the defeat of Hon. H. H. Armstrong, commissioner of highways, and W. L. Hall, the Conservative leader, who went down in Queens County.

DRUNKEN MEN DRIVE OFFICIALS INTO SEA

Inspector Coates and Son of New Brunswick Believed To Have Been Drowned.

Moncton, N. B., July 28.—Word was received early this morning to the effect that last night Inspector Coates, his son and Constable Coates, six miles from Beauséjour, to attend a wedding, where it was suspected some liquor would be found. Towards midnight Constable Coates returned to town in a badly injured condition, and said a fight had taken place between the inspector's party and a number of men at the wedding. In the fracas the attacking party demolished the car in which the officers of the law had arrived on the scene, and claimed they would kill or drown them. When Constable Coates was able to escape, he says, the other members of the party had been driven into the sea and were standing in the water up to their necks.

HEATING ONT. HOMES BY HYDRO POWER NOT FEASIBLE, DECLARES SIR ADAM BECK; IS TOO COSTLY

Former London Member in Legislature Says Winter Load Would Be Too Great and Current Required Would Not Be Available—Present Electrical Devices Would Not Permit General Use of Electricity For Heating.

Toronto, July 28.—Sir Adam Beck, the apostle of hydro-electric power in Ontario, is not very optimistic about heating houses by electricity at a low cost, according to the latest pronouncement of Professor J. W. Dorsey of Winnipeg could claim it is possible.

HOUSING COMMISSION WILL ASK FOR ADDITIONAL \$400,000

London's Appropriation To Be Almost a Million, With New Request—Money Is Needed To Complete Work Already Under Way.

Negotiations which will place London's appropriation on housing close to the million-dollar mark will be commenced with the provincial commission at Toronto Friday by Chairman H. E. Dennis and J. W. Canlin of the local commission. The first appropriation of \$400,000 has been expended and another loan of the same amount will now be requested.

LETTER-CARRIERS WILL PROTEST

Local Men To Take Similar Action To Toronto Posties.

London letter carriers will follow the example of the Toronto postmen, who are protesting against a proposed increase in their wages. The London carriers are expected to hold a meeting on Friday to discuss the matter.

DOMINION GOVT. NOT TO DEMAND ONTARIO'S GUARANTEE ON BONDS

Sir Adam Beck Non-Committal On Report Concerning Acquisition of Right-of-Way.

Toronto, July 28.—It is learned here on good authority that Premier Meighen has given sufficient assurance that the Dominion Government will not insist that the Province of Ontario must guarantee the bonds without the provincial guarantee. "I don't think so," Mr. Hamilton has acknowledged requests for such action, but I think only consideration was promised.

MANY ENTER APPEALS AGAINST DECISIONS OF ONT. MAGISTRATES

Cases Tried in the Provincial Courts To Be Reviewed.

Toronto, July 28.—Twenty-five appeals from decisions of magistrates in 27 Ontario cases throughout the province are pending. They are applications to have convictions quashed on various grounds, mostly because of alleged lack of evidence. Five of the applications are listed for hearing before Mr. Justice Larnock at Oshawa Hall tomorrow morning, all of them out-of-town cases. The attorney-general's department is opposing every application.
