North Branch Supply Better Than South, Says Dr.

That properly chlorinated and bur That properly chlorinated and purified, the water of the north branch of the Thames could be safely used to supplement London's supply of spring water, is the opinion of Dr. H W Hill, recently returned as head of the London Institute of Public Health

The water of the north branch is undoubtedly purer than the water of the south branch, says Dr Hill, but it should not be used without purification. All tests which have been made of the anough not be used without pade of the water of the north branch show the necessity for purification. Any lake water near habitation would just as much require purification. The river water needs chlorination. At times it would need filtration.

Gram of Radium Valued at \$120,000 Will Be Used In Cancer Research

Washington, July 25.—One gram of radium, valued at \$120,000, but sealed in a tiny lead tube for vest po ket carriage, was delivered yesterday by the United States Bureau of Standards to Arthur Roeder, a representative of the New York State Institute for Malignant Diseases.

Tested by the bureau, which certified as to its exact weight, it is said to represent the largest single sale of the element, and was the largest amount ever brought to Washington for certification. It will be used for cancer research at the state's institute, and is part of a total quantity of 2½ grams acquired for the purpose.

The gram of radium constitutes the total amount extracted from 125 tons of ore, which was reduced by the Radio Chemical Corporation at Orange, N. J.


