## WINDSOR BORDER RIVALS PALMIEST DAYS OF 'FRISCO

Cabarets Spring Up Like  
Mushrooms On Canadian  
Riverside.

## OASIS TO DETROITERS

Likened To Barbary Coast in  
City of Golden  
Gate.

WINDSOR, Aug. 13.—Road houses in  
Macomb and Wayne Counties, along the  
river front on the American side of  
the international boundary line, for  
weeks past have suffered severely as a  
result of a general movement of the  
river. Coincidentally hostilities in the  
vicinity of Sandwick, Sunnyside in the  
Ojibway, and up the river along the  
shores of Lake St. Clair, have been  
thrilled nightly with pleasure seekers  
from across the river, who cross by  
hundreds on ferries in automobiles and  
on foot for diversion such as the much-  
famed resorts of the metropolis across  
the waters cannot afford.

With the declaration of war on river-  
front drinking houses on the other side  
of the line last night by Special United  
States Attorney Polioher, a greater  
influx of night parties on this side is  
now anticipated, and local, provincial  
and county authorities here, led by  
Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin, are determined  
to continue the warfare started some  
weeks ago. When the Methodist min-  
ister opened the barrage on the liquor  
traffic here and across the river, the  
floods to a thorough clean-up.

So great has become the rush for the  
Canadian oases, in spite of many thir-  
ty Americans, in spite of huge quantities  
of whiskey being smuggled into the  
so-called Desert of Michigan, that fre-  
quently scores of automobiles are un-  
able to get back over the river on the  
last boat, either because the ferries are  
unable to handle the traffic, or because  
they have missed the "night owl" and  
the occupants are forced to drive into side  
streets and sleep in their cars. Hotel  
accommodation is so limited as to be  
totally inadequate.

**Small Cottages Are Resorts.**  
Numerous dwelling houses in outlying  
districts along the border have been  
converted into road houses, and here  
dancing parties and cabarets with regu-  
lar habitués as entertainers assisted  
by convivial guests from Detroit are  
held, that rival the city of Detroit at  
their best in the old days. Music is  
furnished, and as the hours near mid-  
night sessions approach, the height of  
merriment and occasional brawl, host-  
esses, investigators have declared after  
making rounds of midnight frolics.  
For those who do not dance games of  
craps and roulette are operated quite  
openly in adjoining rooms where huge  
sums are won and lost mostly the  
latter by newly-rich bootleggers whose  
fortunes have been acquired recently  
in huge profits being amassed here.

As an indication of money being  
garnered in from the illicit traffic, the  
number of a small branch bank on a  
side street here recently told the writer  
he had five accounts all in excess of  
\$5,000 deposited with him during the  
past few months and acquired during  
that time by bootleggers, all young men  
scarcely more than youths.

**Big Road Houses Quieter.**  
Resorts commonly known as road-  
houses are growing gradually quieter,  
however, forced through publicity and  
activities of the police and special of-  
ficers to tame down their entertain-  
ments in many, in which liquor laws  
only near beer and occasionally the  
real stuff is dispensed instead. Small  
cottages scattered along lower De-  
troit River, and in upper stretches  
along shores of Lake St. Clair are com-  
ing rapidly into favor, here admittance  
is gained through introduction to own-  
ers and quieter parties are the rule.  
The kitchens are favored as drinking  
rooms, while privileged guests loiter and  
lounge around all parts of the house  
in many cases sleeping there till morn-  
ing when they return to Detroit by  
early ferries.

It is these small cottages that are  
now baffling prohibition enforcement  
officers and it is a stiff battle the lat-  
ter are fighting because of the remote  
location of many and the system of  
warning signals in use by neighbors  
who advise of the approach of in-  
spectors.

So the fight goes on between a  
score of special Ontario officers sta-  
tioned here, the Royal Canadian  
Mounted Police, county and local forces  
on one side and get-rich-quick boot-  
leggers on the other. The determina-  
tion exhibited by Rev. Mr. Spracklin in  
wiping out the business apparently  
forebodes a final clean-up of the  
majority of the palaces of midnight  
joy.

**Afraid To Go Home.**  
But the end is not yet in sight, in  
spite of assurances to the contrary  
from Attorney-General Raney and  
other members of Toronto officialdom.  
"I want to be prosecuted, I've just  
spent all my money on whiskey across  
the river in Windsor, and I'm afraid  
to go home, because my wife is worse  
than Maggie Jiggs," declared a 35-year-  
old Detroitier when he appeared before  
Special United States Attorney Polioher  
in Detroit today.

Mrs. Jiggs was called on the phone  
and notified of her husband's plight,  
and her answer was, "Come home,  
darling, I'm so glad you weren't  
drowned." Jiggs changed his mind  
about going to jail. He went home.

## BAIRN IN DEREHAM COMPLETELY BURNED

Formal Opening of New Inger-  
soll Park Indefinitely  
Postponed.

INGERSOLL, Aug. 13.—The opening  
of the new park, which was to have  
taken place on Sunday, has been post-  
poned indefinitely because of the wet  
weather, which has rendered the  
grounds unfit to accommodate the  
crowds expected to gather. It is only  
a short time since the park was seeded,  
and while there has been a splendid  
growth of grass, it was deemed inad-  
visable to proceed with the formal open-  
ing Sunday. In connection with the  
service in honor of the soldiers who  
gave their lives in the war.

**Honey Crop Good.**  
The honey situation is more prom-  
ising than last year, according to in-  
formation from the neighboring dis-  
tricts, where there is a number of  
well-known apiarists. The crop will be  
much larger than last season and the  
quality better. Last year there was  
very little clover in many districts,  
prices, it is expected, will remain much  
the same as last season.

A large barn on the farm of John  
Sheehan, first concession of Dereham,  
was struck by lightning early this  
morning and completely destroyed. It  
was well filled with grain and hay, but  
the farm animals were outside. An  
implement shed adjoining the barn  
was also destroyed. The loss is par-  
tially covered by insurance.

**Funeral of Austin Miller.**  
The funeral of Austin Miller, who died  
suddenly in Toronto Tuesday night, was  
held this afternoon from the family  
residence, Hall street, to the Methodist  
Church, and was under Masonic au-  
spices. There was a large attendance,  
many of his friends and associates from  
Toronto and elsewhere being present.  
Impressive services were conducted by  
Rev. J. G. Scott and Rev. E. Sheppard.  
Interment was made in the Ingersoll  
Rural Cemetery and the pall-bearers  
were H. W. Ross, Toronto; Fred Mil-  
ler, nephew, Toronto; Justus Miller,  
Hugh Miller, Warren Miller, sons, and  
Charles Roberts, son-in-law.

## LISTOWEL MAKES RECORD IN HIGH SCHOOL EXAMS

LISTOWEL, Aug. 13.—Principal  
Archibald is much elated over the re-  
sult of the provincial examinations and  
with good reason. Nineteen of his

of any high school in the province.

harvesting the largest and best crop of  
flax ever grown in this section. Owing  
to the scarcity of help the price for  
pulling has been advanced to \$25 per  
acre, in former years from \$1 to \$5  
per acre was the ruling price. Grain  
crops are all good. Wheat is being  
threshed, and is yielding well. The fruit  
crop is also very promising.
