DRAFT OF FARMERS' PLATFORM FOR AMATEUR WORK NEXT FEDERAL ELECTION PLACED BEFORE WEST MIDDLESEX U. F. O. FIND DOUGHTY

Propose Adoption of the Reciprocity Pact of 1911, Reduction of Tariff Between Canada and England by Half, Free Imports of Implements and Foodstuffs and New Proposals Regarding Income Tax.

Strathroy, Nov. 24.—The presentation of a draft platform for the United Farmers of Ontario for the next federal election, a suggestion that urban centres be allowed to send representatives to the U. F. O. convention, and an address by U. F. O. Organizer S. C. McKee of Toronto, were the principal features of the third annual meeting of the West Middlesex U. F. O., held here today. The morning session was devoted to business of the organization and the receipt of reports of committees. The principal of which was that of the picnic committee.

The platform suggested by the council of agriculture was a draft of which formed part of the report of County Director Harold Currie, which was presented to each U. F. O. club for consideration by the members, who will give their delegates to the annual meeting at the provincial organization at Toronto in December instructions as to any changes they desire made in the platform.

The principal plank in the draft read by Mr. Currie proposed the adoption of the reciprocity pact of 1911; the reduction of the tariff between Canada and Great Britain by half; the admission to Canada free of all foodstuffs, farm implements and machinery used in the production of the natural resources of the country; the imposition of 2 per cent on incomes of \$1,000 for single men and of \$2,000 for families, rising 2 per cent on each additional \$1,000 income.

The Tariff Question. Owing to the fact that the draft will go to the clubs for consideration, there was much discussion of it. One delegate declared that unless the Canadian tariff wall was kept as high as the American, the country would be swamped with American and other countries' manufactured products. Answering a question about the income tax, Mr. Currie said that as he understood it, the tax on a family of \$2,000, say \$40. A delegate took exception to this, claiming that in the case of a married man with a family, \$40 tax on \$2,000 would be an impossible proposition, and a serious hardship.

Walter Bolton, president of the West Middlesex U. F. O., presided, and in opening the public meeting, explained that Mr. Halbert, who had been announced as the principal speaker, had been unable to attend, and that Mrs. Brody, who was to have addressed the meeting, was unable to be present through sickness. He then introduced S. C. McKee of Toronto, who had been chosen as the guest speaker for the evening.

ONLY FRINGE TOUCHED

Detective Says "Big Story" Lies Underneath Strange Disappearance.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 24.—Leaving today in custody of Austin P. Mitchell, chief of detectives of Portland, John Doughty, former private secretary of Ambrose J. Small, millionaire theatrical man, who disappeared in December last, was en route to the Canadian city to face charges in connection with the case. They were expected to stop at Chicago.

Doughty's movements from the time he left Toronto in December were given out today by officers at Oregon City, where he was arrested Monday night. According to this information Doughty first went across the international line to Buffalo, N.Y., where he had a brief stay, and then to Milwaukee, Wis., taking a train later for Seattle. After a brief stay in Seattle he came to Portland, where he stayed until he went to work at a paper mill in Oregon City on February 23.

Amateur Sleuth. How Doughty was caught as a result of the activity of an amateur detective, Ed. Richardson, who recognized him in Portland about two weeks ago, he had taken a circular he had seen, and his arrest by Constable Fortune of Oregon City, was told today by Richardson.

"I first recognized Doughty in Portland about three weeks ago," Richardson said. "I had seen a circular offering \$15,000 reward for his arrest. I was standing on a street corner in Portland, waiting for an Oregon City car. Doughty passed me and waited for the car a couple of blocks farther on. When I got on the car, I again saw him, and the resemblance to the circular impressed me."

"It was on a Sunday that I first saw him, and I kept close tabs on him until Sunday, when I went to Ed. Fortune and told him I wanted the help of an officer. Richardson said he signed an agreement to divide the reward in case they were successful."

Before he boarded the train today Detective Mitchell said he would recommend that the \$15,000 reward be paid to Richardson. Richardson said he would accept the reward if he could get Doughty.

The proper course of the National Liberal and Conservative party to adopt would be to resign and give the people of Canada an opportunity of electing a government which would be representative of their views."

Declaring the present gas situation the best argument for amalgamation yet offered, Ald. Keyser said that with the various municipalities here joined under one administration, not only could the cities unite on the work of settling the gas shortage by undertaking the joint operation of an artificial plant, but various other important matters before the council, including the joint water supply problem, and unification of all public works enterprises, could be more easily solved.

Time Is Opportunity. "I believe," he said to The Advertiser, "that the time is now ripe for submitting this question to the electors. It has been discussed for years. The Essex Border Utilities Commission has been working toward this end for a long time, but has been hindered in its efforts by particular jealousies of the different factions in the various municipalities. I think it is time the people had an opportunity to express their opinion on this matter. There is no further end to be gained in continuing the Essex Border Utilities Commission."

The debentures will run for fifteen years, bearing 6 per cent interest.
