

## **EXPECTS TO PREDICT WEATHER ACCURATELY FOR MONTHS AHEAD**

Ottawa, Dec. 9.—Canadian Press.—Weather forecasts for months ahead will be possible within a few years as a direct result of solar observation, according to R. M. Stewart, assistant director of the Dominion Observatory, addressing the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada here last night. He explained that the sun has a very great influence over the varying weather conditions on the earth, and stated that the recent observations have led to the belief that the observatories will in future be able to predict with accuracy the general trend of the weather for six months or even a year ahead. To be able to foretell the amount of precipitation and the general temperature for several months ahead may take fifty or even one hundred years of observation, he said, but he expressed the confidence of the observatory that this end would finally be reached.

# SINN FEIN LEADERS **ANXIOUS FOR TRUCE** IN IRISH CONFLICT

Bishop of Perth Conveys Message to This Effect to Lloyd George.

PREMIER IMPRESSED

Prospects Brighter Again For Peace by Christmas.

London, Dec. 9 .- Prospects of an Irish truce, which last night were generally regarded as having receded almost out of sight, have been revived, according to a late edition of the Daily Mail, as result of a private interview between Mgr. Patrick Joseph Clune, Bishop of Perth, Australia, and Preminer Lloyd George yesterday. Mgr. Clune has been prominently mentioned in recent Irish dispatches as carrying on negotiations looking to a truce with leaders of the Sinn Fein movement. The bishop, the newspaper declares, conveyed to Mr. Lloyd George what in effect was a message from Michael Collins, commander of the Sinn Fein army. It is understood the impression was given that Collins and other Sinn Fein leaders were extremely anxious for a truce, and were preparing to take definite steps to secure it. The Daily Mail adds that the premier was much impressed, concluding by saying: "It may definitely be stated that prospects for a settlement are much brighter than they appear on the surface."
