### SUFFRAGETTES INVAD PREMIER'S RESIDENCE

Chain Themselves Up to Iron Fence to Avoid Being Arrested.

LONDON, Jan. 17.—The arrival of the ministry in Downing-street to-day to attend the first meeting of the cabinet before the assembling of parliament was made the occasion of a public demonstration by the women suffragists.

The police anticipated trouble, and a large force was present, but the women succeeded in making their way inside the residence of Premier Campbell-Bannerman, and five arrests were made before order was restored.

Some of the demonstrators adopted a novel manner of protest, carrying off by the police. They had attached to their belts stout chains, which, when they saw the police about to lay hands on them, they quickly threw around the iron railing in front of the building.

The police had to break these chains by force before they could get the women away.

The suffragettes were subsequently arraigned in the Bow-street Police Court. They refused to give sureties for their good behavior, and were sent to prison for three weeks.

### Women's Welcome Hosts.

Miss M. A. Fitzgibbon, secretary of the Women's Welcome Hostel, at 66 Wellesley-street, in closing her report before the ladies' board at the annual meeting, which was held yesterday afternoon, said: "The measure of success has been so satisfactory that it is with humble gratitude to the giver of all that I submit this report for 1907. Out of 642 women received at the home from the British Women's Emigration Society, and the Church of England Emigration Society, all have been placed in good situations, and with but two exceptions are doing well, the latter being cases of insanity, and coming under government regulation covering cases within two years after the arrival of the immigrant, were expatriated."

Miss Fitzgibbon expressed a hope that a further grant would be obtained from the Ontario Government to enlarge the present building. Gratitude was also expressed for a grant of \$1000 from the Dominion Government which has enabled them to make necessary repairs throughout the premises.

The treasurer, Mrs. J. F. Smith, reported the receipts for the year of \$3308.14, and a disbursement of \$3145.36, leaving a balance of \$212.78.

Upon the resignation of Mrs. E. B. Osler, Mrs. J. K. Kerr has been elected president of the board.

INGERSOLL, Jan. 17.—(Special.)—The explosion of the moving picture machine which was followed by fire caused a panic at the Ingersoll Five Cent Theatre last night. The machine was elevated in the front window, which was demolished by the shock and intense heat.

The audience escaped by way of a rear exit.

The firemen extinguished the fire, which seriously damaged the building. The machine, which was valued at \$300, together with other paraphernalia, was destroyed.

### RACE HORSE DROPS DEAD.

BROCKVILLE, Jan. 17.—(Special.)—General Johnston, a race horse belonging to the late James G. Warnock, while being exercised to-day on the street, dropped dead. In turning around the animal was kicked by the driver, and dropping in his tracks, died instantly. General Johnston was a good campaigner, and was seven years old. He had a mark of 2:12-4, and was considered the best horse in the Warnock string.

Brockville Fair Association.

BROCKVILLE, Jan. 17.—(Special.)—The Brockville Fair Association held its annual meeting here to-day, when the following officers were elected for this year: Honorary president, W. H. The annual report showed that there is a deficit of \$49.48 on last year's exhibit, due to the decreased rate receipts on account of rainy weather. Plans for enlarging the scope of the next fair were discussed.

### DON'T ASK THE ENGINEER TO DO THE IMPOSSIBLE

Chairman McGhie Gives Some Wholesome Advice to the Works Committee.

Some wholesome advice was given the members of the works committee by the new chairman, Ald. McGhie, at yesterday afternoon's sitting, the first of the year.

It was, substantially, "Don't shovel loads of useless motions into the city engineer's department, but give him more time to attend to the real business."

The chairman spoke of the current talk about the need of reorganization, and ventured the opinion that the practice of loading up Mr. Rust with a great number of motions had hampered his usefulness in the past, and had resulted in their criticism. Mr. Rust should not be asked to report upon any scheme which the mover did not regard as a practical undertaking.

And Still They Come.

An array of motions on the order paper, many of them of a kind complained of, were turned over to Mr. Rust to give him food for thought for the next few weeks.

The board of control's proposal that the cutting on an overpass, sewer, from University Creek sewer to the Don, the cost of which is estimated at \$200,000, be distributed over four years, was approved and sent on to council.

The original proposal that Harbor-street be extended from Clinton-street to Ossington-avenue, having been altered so as to provide for pushing the extension on to Dovercourt-road, the city solicitor will be asked to report on whether the addition can be legally made.

Ald. Foster, Whytock and Bredin were appointed members of the 1908 street-naming committee.

The board of control yesterday agreed that Mayor Oliver should go to Ottawa to protect the city's interest in regard to the Hamilton Radial Railway bill, should such step be found advisable.

Controller Ward, in urging that tenders for the waterworks pipe be hurried up, said he had been informed that the Canada Foundry Company would lay off 80 men next week.

The complaint that the city's streets are "overrun with a constantly increasing number of mongrel curs, many of them vicious and not a few of them vicious, was contained in a letter from A. Chelew, 428 College-street. It was sent to the police commissioner.

The city engineer said that he will recommend the appointment of an assistant to relieve him of some of the routine work of his department.

### RAILWAYS GUILTY.

Jury Say They Maintain a Danger at Foot of Bay Street.

The jury in the sessions yesterday, after a short deliberation, returned a verdict of guilty against both the C.P.R. and the Grand Trunk for maintaining a nuisance and for failure to protect life and property at the foot of Bay-street.

The verdict will appeal to a higher court on the main ground that they were under the jurisdiction of the railway board. Judge Winchester held that they were amenable to the charge of criminal negligence laid against them.

### EXHIBITION'S GROWTH FOR THE LAST 6 YEARS

Treasurer Leslie Presents Some Interesting Statistics in the Annual Report.

The last meeting of the exhibition board before the annual meeting, which will take place on Tuesday, the 28th inst., in No. 1 committee-room at the city hall, was held yesterday afternoon. The executive committee's report, which was carried unanimously, stated that a communication had been received from Prince Edward Island, notifying the board that they accept the proposition to take part in the provincial governments' exhibit. The western provinces have the matter under advisement, pending the consideration of their estimates when their governments meet. It was recommended that the treasurer, Mr. J. K. Leslie, be authorized to visit the provinces for the week of January 14, in order to explain the project and secure, if possible, the co-operation of these provinces.

It was also decided that application should be made to the Buffalo Passenger Association for extension of the excursion area in the United States on lines leading into Buffalo, and that portable dressing-rooms should be secured for the performers in front of the grand stand.

The annual report of the association was submitted and carried en bloc, the treasurer's review of the last six years showing a profit of \$32,271.65, being received with an outburst of applause.

Treasurer Leslie presented the following review of the past six years:

Increase in revenue, 154 per cent. in last six years.

Increase expenditure, 67.7 per cent.

Increase in profit from a loss of \$16,136.71 to a profit of \$41,873.84, equal to 360 per cent.

During the same period the admission fees to the grounds have increased from \$24,128.15 to \$39,263.80, or 62 per cent.

The admission fee to the grand stand from \$21,362.85 to \$49,602.25, or 133 per cent.

The profit from the special shows from \$1782.52 to \$2722.00, or 56 per cent.

The profit from the special shows from \$2722.00 to \$23,743.53, or 210 per cent.

The expenses of management, that is, the manager and secretary's salaries and the treasurer's departments, have increased from \$6169.30 to \$10,167.25, or only 64 per cent.

The prize account, which, in 1901, amounted to \$33,752, is, in 1907, \$44,049, being an increase of \$10,297.

The expenditure on buildings and grounds, and handed in cash to the city treasurer, out of the profits of the exhibition during that period, \$296,271.65.

### KESTER THE CANDIDATE IN NORTH ONTARIO

Hon. A. G. MacKay Addressed the Convention—The Choice Was Unanimous.

BEAVERTON, Jan. 17.—The North Ontario Liberal convention to nominate a candidate for the legislature was held in Alexandria Hall, and was a success both in numbers and enthusiasm.

The presence of Hon. A. G. MacKay gave interest to the occasion, and the leader captured the delegates by his address. He was followed by George F. Grant of the Dominion House who presented and addressed the meeting.

Resolutions expressing confidence in the administration of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and approval of the course adopted by Hon. A. G. MacKay were carried unanimously.
