Once Witch, Now Saint. ROME, Jan. 25.—In the hall of the consistory this morning the Pope read the decree approving the solemn beatification of Joan of Arc.

In his address, the Pope said that he was never so satisfied as when, thru the help of God, he was able to raise to the altars those who, leaving on earth the perfume of their virtues, show with the assistance of the Almighty, the miracles of heaven.

His Holiness also took occasion to explain of the present condition of society, which, he said, is afflicted by unbelief.
