Note and Comment

There's nothing much to say about Shrubb's victory over St. Yves on Saturday in New York, except that the Englishman was in rare form, and that the Frenchman is not the phenomenon at all distances that his going in the Derby seemed to indicate. The time—1.26.12—is only 13.3-5 seconds faster than made in the Derby at the same distance, when Shrubb was ahead. Indeed, at fifteen miles, Alfred seems now invincible, as it was years ago that Appleby lowered his colors. The latter holds the record for the distance, viz., 1.20.04.3-5.

It was one of Shrubb's easiest wins. The Briton gained a lap after the first three and a half miles, and after that he had the Frenchman where he wanted him. St. Yves did his best, but was outclassed at the distance. More than 10,000 people saw the race, which was for a percentage saw the race, which was for a percentag of the gate receipts which amounted t nearly \$15,000, it, was said. Altho it was chilly weather for outdoor racing, nearly 7000 followers turned out to see the mate race. When Shrubb completed the tent mile, his time was 55 minutes 39 seconds nearly three minutes faster than the time made at the Garden in a similar rac with Longboat.

At thirteen miles Shrubb was jogging behind the Frenchman, and looked happy. The New York Sun thus describes an uneventful finish: At the end of the next half-mile Shrubb went out to set pace for about fifty yards. Then it was that St. Yves began to run faster than at any, previous stage of the race, and quickly, drew away from the Briton. He had picked up about forty yards and the crowd roared approval. The Frenchman then was running at a terrific speed and cutting down his rival's lead rapidly. Shrubb, however, with less than a mile to go, took things easy and let St. Yves go at his own gait. When St. Yves had cut down Shrubb's lead by nearly half a lap, the latter began to sprint, but he did not keep it up long, as he knew that he had the race in hand. Shrubb finished the last lap with tremendous speed and received an ovation. He won in the most impressive manner by a lap and three-quarters in 1 hour 26 minutes 12 seconds.

The late Capt. Charles Campbell, whose funeral takes place to-day from the Grand Union Hotel, is another athlete just passed to the great beyond. He was an all-round amateur, proficient especially in rowing and baseball and figured frequently fifteen and twenty years ago in the amateur boxing shows given by the To-
