NOTICE TO HAMILTON SUBSCRIBERS.
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POLICE RAID SOCIAL CLUB AND ARREST 27 NEGROES

Gambled on Lord's Day—Several Others in the Toils—Sunday Happenings.

HAMILTON, June 27.—(Special.)—Early Sunday morning the police raided the Imperial Social Club, McNob-street, near Market-street, and arrested 27 colored men. It is charged by the police that a crap game was in progress. Sgts. Finch, Walsh and Detective Sayer had charge of the raid. Johnson tried to escape by crawling along a ledge on the second story and fell to the pavement. He recovered consciousness on the way to the hospital with a dislocated knee. Fifteen of the crowd were admitted to bail at \$20 each. Charles Warnisley is charged as the keeper, an dth others with gambling on the Lord's Day.

SHOT WITNESS' HORSE

Alleged Case of Revenge—A Small Boy Drowns.

NORTH BAY, June 27.—Gardner Blake-McMinn, aged ten, son of J. D. McMinn, a lumberman, was drowned while bathing at Rutherglen, twenty-six miles east of North Bay. The body was taken to Huntsville for burial.







MISS MOYES AGAIN LOSES

Beaten With Miss Green in Double Final—Wonderful Miss Hotchkiss.
PHILADELPHIA, June 28.—Capturing four cups, all emblematic of the highest honors in the lawn tennis world, Miss Hazel Hotchkiss of Berkeley, California, made a clean sweep to-day in the women's national singles championship, defeating in the challenge round Mrs. Barger-Wallach of New York; with Miss Hotchkiss of Boston she won the women's national doubles championship, with Miss Hotchkiss of Philadelphia. This is a record equalled not even by Miss May Sutton, the other California woman, who won only the singles championship. Miss Hotchkiss' victory over Mrs. Barger-Wallach was a hollow one, she allowing last year's champion six points in the first set and one game in two sets.
