DAVID MITCHELL MAY DIES FROM HIS BURNS

Father of Noted Rifleman Badly Injured—Serious Fire Stopped By Thunderstorm—City Notes.

HAMILTON, March 20.—(Special.)—Sparks from a T. H. & B. locomotive started a fire on the roofs of 18 and 20 Allison-street about 1.30 Sunday morning. The roofs and attics were destroyed, and much furniture damaged. No. 18 is owned by Mrs. Anstey, and 20 is occupied by J. P. Morgan. The loss to each will be about \$1,800. Morgan carried no insurance. His 11-year old son Horace was ill from scarlet fever and had to be removed to the house of a neighbor. When the firemen arrived, clouds of sparks were being carried by a gale towards the Collegiate Institute, and Boys' Home, but blunder was averted by a violent thunder storm after 2 o'clock. There was a small fire at Jos. Taylor's, 237 Bold-street, Saturday night.

The police raided a house in the rear of 59 North Hughson-street Saturday and arrested Mrs. Terence Scott, as keeper and Marie Innes, as inmate. Casteline Innes, an Italian; John Johnson, an Indian from Caledonia, and Harry Pasquale, 170 West Barton-st., and George Carelli, 84 Strachan-st., were arrested as inmates. James Willman died Saturday night at the home of his mother, 139 East Jackson-street, in his 16th year. Miss Sarah McCoppin passed away this evening in her 94th year. The funeral will take place from the home of her niece, Mrs. C. C. Graham, 200 North Hughson-street, on Tuesday, when the remains will be sent to Whitfield for interment.

Shoemaker Badly Burned. David Mitchell, a shoemaker, who roomed over at East Main-street, was perhaps fatally burned in a fire that broke out in his room to-night. James Baker, 189 Canada-street, saw smoke, and turned in an alarm. Assistant Chief Atchison found Mitchell unconscious on the bed. He was taken to the City Hospital, suffering from very severe burns about the face and head. It is thought that a small gas stove set fire to the bedding, and that he was overcome with the smoke. Mitchell was formerly a well-known rifle shot in the 13th Regt. He is the brother of the Mitchell brothers, the well-known riflemen. The fire did little damage.

Mrs. G. J. Halstead, Fulton, had a purse containing \$30 stolen from her on the central market Saturday. Rev. R. A. King, principal of the Indore College, preached a special sermon at Knox Church to-day, on India. Will Leave it to the People. Now five courts have ordered council to build a House of Refuge, the council have decided to meet specially next Tuesday to consider the question. They propose to submit a bylaw to the people, who, they are confident, will vote it down by a large majority. They think if that happens the government will have to change the act.

CHANCE TO GET PLACED IN THE CIVIL SERVICE

Hundred and Ten Positions Are Vacant—Indications of Early Organization of the Naval Dept.

OTTAWA, March 20.—(Special.)—The civil service commission is advertising for candidates to fill 110 positions. Of these the more important are several which point to an early organization of the civil staff of the naval service.

Candidates for several of the positions must have an acquaintance with naval matters, which will greatly restrict the field of choice. They are: An officer in charge of the naval stores branch, marine and fisheries department; grade I B, initial salary \$2,190; assistant officer in the same grade I I A, initial salary \$1,600; candidates must have special experience in the purchase and management of naval supplies.

Other vacancies are: Accountant, naval branch, grade I B, initial salary \$2,190; considerable knowledge of naval accounts necessary. Also two accountants for the accountants' branch, grade I I A, initial salary \$1,600. Clerk for naval branch, grade I I B, initial salary \$1,200; candidates must have a thorough knowledge of naval routine work, including routine.

Draftsman, grade I I B, initial salary \$1,200; two clerks, hydrographic survey branch of the department of marine and fisheries, grade I I B, initial salary \$900. Six clerks, topographical survey branch of the department of the interior, grade I I B, initial salary \$1,000.

The examinations will be held May 10, at such centres as may prove convenient. Other posts for which competition will be held are: Twenty clerkships (for men) in grade I I A, initial salary \$1,600. Fifteen positions as stenographers and typewriters (for men), in grade I I B, initial salary \$900. Fifteen positions as stenographers and typewriters (for women), in grade I I B, initial salary \$900. Forty clerkships (for men), in grade I I B, initial salary \$900.

The examinations will begin May 10, at Halifax, Yarmouth, Sydney, Charlottetown, St. John, Fredericton, Moncton, Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Kingston, Hamilton, Toronto, London, Sault Ste. Marie, Fort Arthur, Winnipeg, Brandon, Regina, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton, Nelson, Vancouver and Victoria.

A general examination for positions as messenger, porter, packer or sorter will be held at the same time and place.

University Sermon

Canon Tucker, secretary of the Anglican Missionary Society, preached the university sermon yesterday morning, but did not speak from any text. He chose as his subject, "The Making of National Life or the Building up of a Nation."

"In national life," he said, "there are three factors, first, the land; second, its baptism or consecration, and third, its people." A review of the possibilities of Canada was then outlined by the speaker, who said that it was only beginning to discover its own resources. Cobalt contained some of the most valuable deposits in the world; the west had become one of the richest growing regions, whereas once it was thought to be fit only for the buffalo; British Columbia was a province of unknown and valuable promise, with many valuable resources and with scenery that rivaled the mountains of Switzerland or the highlands of Scotland.

"All the possibilities of greatness are to be found in national life," he said in emphasizing the real force, which went to build up a nation. "The vital element in national life is the manhood and the citizenship."

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the country, because in manhood is the solution of all our problems. The solution of the temperance problem is the manhood that can contain itself at the door of the saloon. The purity of the nation is found in the chivalry of the nation. A man who commits an offence against a woman is committing an outrage against humanity."

"How are we to develop our manhood?" was the significant question asked by the speaker in concluding his sermon. "Man property understood as a citizen is a moral and spiritual being; one who has a character, who can distinguish between right and wrong, who will stand up for right and who values eternity above all that belongs to time."

The Bible Canon Tucker characterized as the book which furnished the agencies to develop the moral and spiritual aptitudes of the nation and the four pillars of national life were God's holy word, holy church, holy day and holy home.
