executive. In the future all landed purchases of bacon, ham, lard, butter and cheese in the United States will be pooled thru this executive, thus eliminating competitive buying between the allies, which raises prices in the United States and at home. Baron Rhonda went on appreciatively in regard to Lord Northcliffe's efforts in the United States, adding:

**Special Mission.**  
"A special mission representing the ministry of war will be leaving here for New York. Owen Hugh Smith, who has been minister of munitions in the United States, will be attached to Lord Northcliffe's organization. Mr. Smith will be accompanied by various experts on food production and purchase. (Wall Street Journal.)

**C. A. M. Phillips**, who went to the United States with Foreign Secretary Balfour, has returned to England and been appointed by the cabinet as a channel of communication between the government departments and the British mission in the United States.

Baron Rhonda also announced that Sir Joseph White Todd, a member of the British sugar commission, and J. R. Drake, a London broker, were going to New York as the British members of Mr. Hoover's sugar committee.

Mr. Hoover has informed Baron Rhonda that the United States would not be a competitor in the Java market. The formation of an inter-allied council to deal with the allocation of all war supplies required in the United States is rapidly progressing.

**To Win War.**  
"I hope the exportable surplus of Canadian and American primary foodstuffs will be much larger than the present estimates, as the results of food economies by which the United States and Canadian homes are helping to win the war just as surely as the production of munitions," Baron Rhonda said.
