PLAYS, PICTURES AND MUSIC

QUEBEC BRIDGE PICTURES.

Commencing today and continuing tomorrow and Saturday, 1000 feet of moving pictures, showing the collapse of the 5200-ton truss of the Quebec bridge, will be shown exclusively at Loew's Yonge Street Theatre.
