Announcement was made yesterday by Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, of the appointment of a committee to enquire into the subject of a system of rural credits for Ontario. Those selected by the minister to compose the committee are: Prof. W. T. Jackman, political economy department, University of Toronto; Thomas McMillan, farmer, Seaforth; Melville H. Staples, B.A., farmer, Millbrook.

"I have long felt," said the minister, in making the announcement, "that some system of rural credits would be of much advantage to agriculture in Ontario, but I am convinced that any system should be safe and sound, and should be provided to meet the peculiar needs of the province. Conditions here differ from the conditions in the newer provinces in the west, where rural credit plans have been carried out.

"The committee will be expected to enquire into the different plans adopted, both in the different provinces of Canada and across the line. They will do this both by a study of the legislation, and to some extent probably a personal investigation among those farmers who have taken advantage of these schemes. They will also later on probably arrange to meet farmers in various parts of the province of Ontario, so as to get, not only full knowledge of the needs, but a complete understanding of the views and desires of the farmers on this sub-
