BIG AUTO SHOW IN GOTHAM OPENED

New York Motor Exhibition Throws Open Doors to Record-Breaking Crowds—Exhibits Valued at Over Two Million Dollars.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—A feature of the opening of the automobile show tonight is the presence at Madison Square Gardens of many Canadians of prominence who are in the city attending the fisheries conference.

The principal features of the show are briefly as follows: Five hundred and seventy-eight accessory and motorcycle exhibits. Value of exhibits \$2,000,000. Lowest priced car \$450. Highest priced car, \$16,000.

Expenditure for decorations, \$45,000. Attendance on society nights, Tuesday and Thursday, is expected to surpass the horse show.

The exhibition spaces of the main floor and elevated platform are covered with a carpet of light green hue, with a consequent gain of spectacular effect and out-of-door feeling.
