London, May 17—(Special)—Sir William Vanhorne, interviewed at the Savoy Hotel, where he is staying for a while before making trip to the continent, said one thing was certain about the railways of North America: Their charges were much too low. They were not earning as much as they should on the capital invested, and he did not feel hopeful of an increased percentage of earnings. The "Railways of America," declared Sir William, "are doing more for less money than any others in the world." He did not think Government ownership the solution of the railway problem. No government ever ran railways as cheaply as a private management could do. Sir William said the general business and financial situation looked most promising, but he did not think there would be a great deal of railway building in America during the next twelve months.
