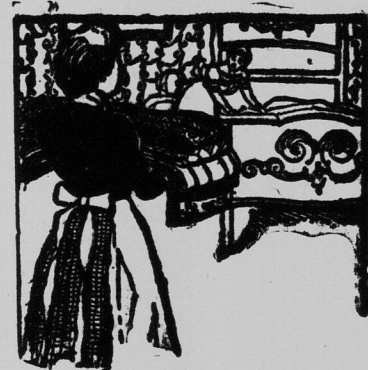

Pittsburgh—The First National Bank of

coins 331,000 pounds of gold, 170,000

pounds of silver and 80,000 pounds of

gold, a total of \$81,000,000.

New York—Total imports of gold for
