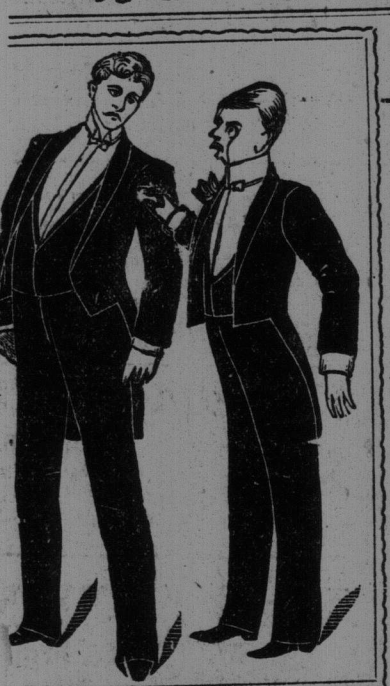

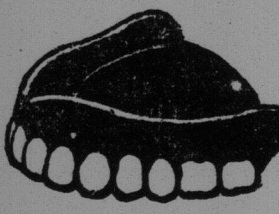

Senator G. G. King, of Chipman, and his son, G. H. King, passed through yesterday on their way to Cranbrook, B. C., where E. L. King, another son of the senator, is quite ill. Word has been received that Mr. King is recovering.

Flags are flying at half mast today on all public buildings, banks, leading business houses and steamers in the harbor, out of respect to the memory of the governor general's daughter, Lady Grenfell, whose body arrived here today for transportation to England on the Empress of Britain.

A very enjoyable sleigh drive to Whitehead was held Monday evening to the home of Mr. and Mrs. John S. Edwards, when about forty of their friends from the city spent a pleasant evening of music and games. On behalf of the company, Miss Reta Eagles presented a handsome vase to the hostess. The success of the affair was due largely to the efforts of the Misses Eagles.

Maurice Jacobs, an English Jew, aged 23, was brought to the city yesterday by Alphonse Rachinabel, one of the guards of the Montreal immigration office. He arrived in this country in 1906 and worked in Montreal until convicted of stealing a diamond pin from his employer. For the offence he was given a long term in the penitentiary, but it was decided to deport him, and he sails on the Empress of Britain.

The Grand Temple of Honor last year offered a prize of \$5 in gold to the boy who would bring the largest number of new members into any section and keep them in good standing for a year. Last night S. E. Logan, D. M. W. T., presented Master William Brown, V. A., of La Tour Section, with the gold pin, and a second prize of \$2.50 was won by Master Chase, of Alexandria Section.

The pupils of the High School are enjoying one session now. For the past few days workmen have been busy repairing the heating apparatus and while this is being done the scholars are dismissed at one o'clock to allow the repair work to be carried on without inconvenience to the teachers and scholars. The meeting will be held in the board of trade rooms on Friday afternoon of next week.—Halifax Herald.

THE CIVIC
ELECTIONS

One Citizen Suggests that Board of Trade Put Ticket of Business Men in Field.

Unless there is an awakening of the citizens from the apathy that marks their bearing toward civic affairs at the present time, it seems unlikely that the civic elections to be held a few weeks hence will be of much interest, and but slight change will be effected in the council.

Speaking with some of the leading merchants yesterday the question of the approaching elections was broached and elicited scarcely any interest. One prominent business man gave it as his opinion that the board of trade, which is composed of good level headed men, should carry the day in the market and endeavor to place a ticket of the leading business men in the field. There had been talk some time ago, he said, of some of the merchants getting together and considering the matter, but all interest had apparently died out and nothing was being done.

LADY GRENFELL'S
BODY ARRIVES

It Was Placed on Empress of Britain for Shipment to England --- Britain Takes Large Passenger List.

The steamer Empress of Britain, which sails this evening, will take away about 400 to 450 passengers and a good general cargo. The Montreal train arrives today in four sections. The first section, which is the regular train, arrived as usual about 12.05. The second section, on which was the body of Lady Victoria Grenfell, daughter of Earl Grey, Governor General of Canada, arrived about two hours later, and went direct to Sand Point, where the body was placed on board the steamer.

The party accompanying the body consisted of Arthur Grenfell, R. Grenfell, Mr. Grenfell, Mrs. Bullard, Lady Sybil Grey and Col. Sir Henry Rawlinson. The body is being taken to England for interment.

One of the baggage rooms in the Empress of Britain, in which the casket will rest, has been converted into a temporary mortuary chamber, and decorated with boughs and evergreens.

There was no ceremony attached to the transfer of the casket from the train to the steamer. The funeral car was simply drawn to the side of the big vessel and the casket taken aboard.

The bulk of the passengers for the steamer will arrive in the third section, and it is expected will embark on the steamer here, and the fourth section, with the overseas mail and baggage will likely go through to Halifax and be placed on the steamer at that port.

Among the St. John people taking passage on the Empress are Judge and Mrs. A. I. Truman and James Manchester.

NEWSPAPER MEN FORM

"DAYLIGHT" K. OF P.

(Boston Post, Feb. 6.)

Named after a plucky American printer and under auspicious surroundings, with an initial membership of 39, Horace Greeley Lodge, No. 163, K. of P. was instituted in Encampment Hall, 724 Washington street, yesterday afternoon by Grand Chancellor Scott and a number of grand officers in the presence of a large number of officers and members of other lodges.

The new lodge is called a "daylight" lodge from the fact that all its members are night workers on newspapers in this city. The institution of a "daylight" lodge is an innovation in this city or in New England, and there are only four others in the country. The candidates were put through the first rank by Unity Lodge of Boston, second rank by Arctus Lodge of West Somerville and third rank by a combined staff.

These are the officers of the new lodge: Chancellor commander, Wm. C. Trump; vice-chancellor, Charles H. Carr; prelate, Charles H. Blackburn; master of work, Charles H. Finley; keeper of records and seal, John C. Hurl; master of exchequer, Malcolm A. Knock; master of finance, Charles C. Perkins; master at arms, Albert W. Slick; inner guard, M. T. B. Royle; outer guard, J. Harry Wallace; trustees, William A. Sims, William L. Hill, Eugene Haskell; past chancellors, Edgar Yates and Hermon D. Pearson.

WINTER PORT NOTES

The valuation of the outward cargo of the Donaldson line steamship Kaituma, now on her way to Glasgow is as follows: Canadian goods, \$126,639; foreign goods, \$18,938. Total \$145,577.

The Donaldson line people, it is stated, have contracted to bring 10,000 passengers before April 1. From now until the opening of navigation on the St. Lawrence river the emigration here from the old country will be large. All the C. P. R. passenger steamers have booked large numbers.

C. P. R. steamship Lake Erie, now on her way to Liverpool, has booked 1,000 passengers on her return trip to this port from Liverpool.

The outward cargo of the C. P. R. steamship Memmouth, now on her way to Bristol from this port, is: Canadian goods, \$20,488; foreign goods, \$27,891. Total \$48,379.

C. P. R. steamship Montezuma, for London and Antwerp, took away \$20,751 worth of Canadian goods, and \$12,623 worth of foreign goods, at a total of \$33,374.

Furness line steamship Almeriana, Capt. Hanks, left London on the 7th inst at 2 p. m. for this port via Halifax.
