BOY IN COURT In the police court this afternoon a boy was charged with the theft of a wagon from the barn of Hugh Milley. It is alleged that the boy had a horse and took the wagon from the complainant's barn and after having enjoyed a drive returned the wagon to the barn.

CORSICAN MEN ARRESTED Four employes of the steamer Corsican were placed under arrest by the C. P. R. officials upon the arrival of the steamer this morning. It is said, but not confirmed, that they are charged with tampering with mail on the voyage from Liverpool.

LIQUOR CHARGE The case against Louis Hudwitz, charged with keeping liquor on his premises in Main street for sale without license, was resumed in the police court today. Several Austrians gave testimony. E. S. Ritchie appeared for the defendant.

MATCHES HIGHER The wholesale price of all grades of matches advanced 10 per cent today, according to wholesale dealers in the city. This will bring the price of the five cent box up to six cents. This is the first advance in the price of matches since the war commenced.

CONVERGING DRIVE ON BULGARIAN CAPITAL FROM THREE DIRECTIONS

On British Front. London, Nov. 27—"Our artillery was active last night in the neighborhood of LaBassee," says today's official report from the Franco-Belgian front. "Otherwise there is nothing to report."

Paris, Nov. 27—"A Havas despatch from Limoges says the city is about to take a census of its inhabitants with a view to instituting family cards for various items of household consumption."

Serbian and Italian Wins. Paris, Nov. 27—"Bulgarian forces on the Macedonian front launched a counter-attack on the Serbians in the Gerna River region last night. The Bulgarians were repulsed with heavy losses. The Italians continue to make progress in the region west of Monastir."

French Report. Paris, Nov. 27—"The French official announcement on the progress of hostilities on the French front reads as follows: "There has been the customary cannonading at various points on the Somme front and in the sectors of Douaumont and Vanx. The night passed quietly on the remainder of the front."

ST. JAMES ST. HOSPITAL The local military hospital, in St. James street, was taken over by the No. 8 Field Ambulance Depot on Saturday, and Major G. G. Corbet, O. C., succeeds Major F. E. Bishop in charge of the institution. As the medical officers, Captains V. D. Davidson and H. L. Walker, already were attached to the 8th, they will make no change in their positions on the staff. Gifts to their positions are acknowledged as follows:—Twenty pairs hospital slippers, collected by Miss Mary Ward; two foot-warmer, Mrs. George McAvity.

SLIGHT FIRE IN SCHOOL A slight fire broke out around the chimney in St. Peter's Boys' School this morning and a still alarm was sent to the hook and ladder station in Portland street. The chemical quickly responded and the blaze was extinguished before much damage was done. The children marched out of the building in good order.
