**QUEEN OF SWEDEN WAS THROUGH RAID**

She Was Visiting Karlsruhe When French Airmen Bombed City

Berlin July 4.—Queen Victoria of Sweden, sister of Grand Duke Frederick of Baden, was at the castle in Karlsruhe during the recent French air raid on that German city when 110 persons were killed by bombs, says an Overseas News Agency despatch from Karlsruhe today. She escaped harm however as on the occasion of the previous raid, when she also was in the city.

In the mission church during the bombardment were the Grand Duke and the Dowager Duchess of Hesse. The service was continued, however, despite the explosions occurring outside, the entire assemblage singing a hymn. Afterwards, before the raid was entirely over, some explosions still being heard, Grand Duchess Louise visited the wounded.

The despatch charges that some of the bombs dropped were poisonous in their effect.

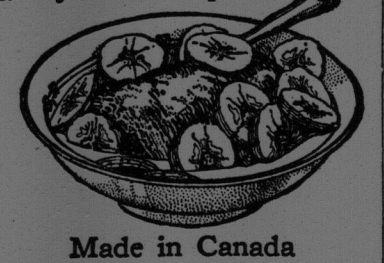
**CHURCH OF ENGLAND PULPITS**

Several committees of the Church of England were held in the afternoon. Bishop of Fredericton, Archdeacon Newnam, St. Stephen, and Forsyth, Chatham, were amongst those present.

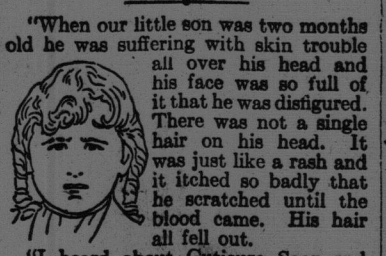

Lieut. Charles Fairweather, of Sussex, who left this city as a subaltern, is now a major, having been through the recent heavy fighting and received this splendid promotion.

Capt. May Promoted.

It is reported that Captain F. F. May, who has seen service with the 20th Battalion and was wounded and invalided home, is to take command of one of the companies of the 105th P. E. Island battalion under the command of Lieut. Colonel Ings.

Lieut. L. B. G. Bonnell of the 62nd Regt., he had been home from Aldershot where he successfully passed the lieutenant examinations in infantry.

It is reported that Captain Frederick F. Giesey has been appointed second in command of one of the companies of the 14th Battalion. E. B. is reported that the four subalterns were to get vacant captaincies.

**THE BAPTIST DISTRICT**

India's loyalty to the British empire in the great war and a general discussion of the wonderland of the East was the subject on which Rev. R. E. Gullison gave a very interesting talk last evening at the Central Baptist church as part of the closing exercises of the first day of the twelfth annual meeting of the United Baptist churches of the sixth district of the New Brunswick association.

Dr. DeWolfe, of Acadia University, and Rev. Dr. W. C. Kierstead, of U. N. B., also took up very interesting phases of the work and gave liberal discussions.

Dr. DeWolfe took up the ideals of education in Acadia. He said that education was related only physically to men, and that an education that did not touch religion was faulty. A relation of what was had done for the university showed that 800 students had enlisted and that the Seminary Red Cross had also been organized.

Dr. Kierstead dealt chiefly with foreign missions in relation to the war. He said that the efficiency of the missions had not been impaired during the past year by the falling off of financial aid from the western provinces.

Rev. W. H. Robinson has accepted a call to the Southampton field so recently vacated by the lamentable death of Rev. J. B. Woodland.

The deep and sincere sympathy of the whole denomination will go out to Dr. Colby, a veteran treasurer of Acadia University. On Saturday, June 24th, he was called to Ottawa by the sad intelligence of the death of his only son, A. W. C. Cohen of the civil service. A useful and promising life has been brought to an early close. He will be greatly missed not only in the home circles but also in the Fourth Baptist church, of which he was a valued member.

**Board Condemns Three Dwellings**

At a meeting of the Board of Health held last night, three dwellings were given a three month notice to make necessary improvements to their premises or else close the properties.

In response to a communication from the St. John Association for the prevention of tuberculosis the board decided to contribute their share of an increase in the salary of the trained nurse employed by the association.

The secretary was instructed to proceed against all milk vendors, selling milk in the city of St. John, who have not yet taken out the necessary licence. The delinquents to date number about fourteen.

A report by Miss Brophy, with respect to cases of tuberculosis, was submitted and approved.

Dr. Johnston, dairy inspector for the city submitted a report in which it was stated that certain premises are not meeting the requirements, although, in the majority of cases, conditions were sound.

**GERMAN TRIBUTE TO CANADIAN GALLANTRY**

London, July 4.—The Cologne Volkszeitung, describing the gallant stand made by the Canadians at Ypres at the beginning of the month, says many of them made an obstinate resistance, preferring to be killed rather than surrender. One general and several officers who refused to give in were killed. The general drew his sword and when a sergeant demanded his surrender he cut him through the face, whereupon an infantryman bayoneted him. Many such groups who resisted desperately and refused all mercy had to be cleared out with bombs.
