## 24,564,574 AUTOS COUNTED IN WORLD

MONTREAL, Nov. 3.—In 1919 official registrations of motor vehicles throughout the world numbered 8,852,394, of which 7,665,440 were owned in the United States; in 1925 this world total had increased to 24,564,574, the neighboring republic still having the lion's share with 19,954,347.

While the United States has one motor vehicle for every 5.7 of its population Canada has only one for every 12. New Zealand has one for every 13; Australia one for every 20, Great Britain one for every 40 and France one for every 54. In the United States the motor vehicle industry has capital invested of nearly two billion dollars, people employed, directly or indirectly, of about three million and a half, a payroll of approximately \$600,000,000 and a total production in 1925 of 4,336,754 cars and trucks, having a wholesale value of \$2,977,904,833. In 1919 Canada produced only 87,835 motor vehicles. In 1925 production reached

A lengthy debate ensued over this particular case, but after two adjournments Judge Patterson rendered his verdict in favor of the defence. Ac-

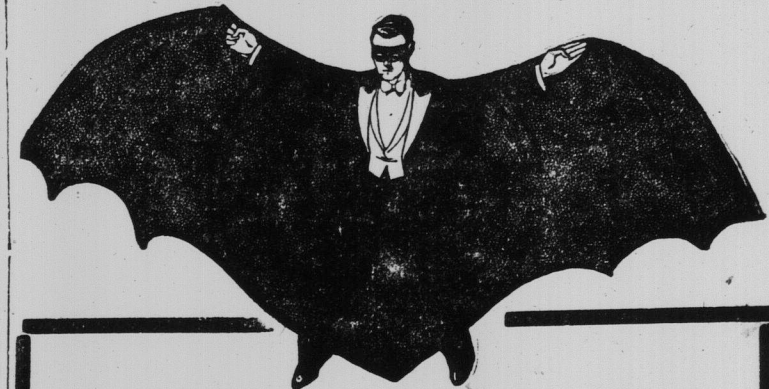

FREDERICTON, Nov. 3.—The Divorce Court this afternoon devoted the entire time to the hearing of the suit of David J. Canick vs. Gertrude A. Canick. The plaintiff in this case resides in Saint John and the defendant at Mispec. Thomas Melvin of Mispec and Stanley Clifton of Saint John were named as co-respondents. Several witnesses were examined and some gave evidence in support of the allegations, that the defendant was in the company of Melvin at Mispec at various times. C. R. Hawkins appeared for the plaintiff. This case is complicated by the fact that the wife, now defendant, was plaintiff in an action for divorce brought against the husband about a year ago. Mr. Justice Crockett referred to that fact and to the necessity for being satisfied that no collusion exists. Court considers.
