MONCTON BOARD TO AFFILIATE WITH DOMINION

Trade Body At Railway
Town Acts On President's
Recommendation

W. E. ANDERSON GIVES
TOURIST ASSN. PLANS

Asks Assistance In Drive To
Bring More Visitors To
Province

MONCTON, May 1.—A meeting of the Board of Trade held in the Council Chambers last night was largely attended. President O. Hanford Blakney occupied the chair.

President Blakney gave a brief report on the matter of affiliation with the Dominion Board of Trade, and it was decided that the Moncton Board of Trade affiliate with the Dominion Board.

The report of the Library Committee will be presented May 10.

W. E. Anderson of Saint John, representing the New Brunswick Tourist and Resources Association, appeared before the board and gave a comprehensive outline of the aims and plans of the association during the coming season. He stressed the importance of organization for the tourist trade, and said that over half a million was left in the province each season by tourists.

Mr. Anderson concluded by saying he hoped Moncton would do its share towards financing the necessary advertising.

COMMITTEE NAMED.

After considerable discussion it was decided that a committee of the board be appointed to take action in regard to the re-organization of a Moncton branch of the Tourist Association.

The improvement of Moncton's natural park occupied the attention of the meeting and a program of improvements was suggested. When present intrusions are carried out, Moncton will have parks with artificial lakes that should add much beauty to its surroundings.

Seeks Body To Collect Insurance of \$2,000

NEW YORK, May 1.—Mrs. Domitilla Tamielis, Brooklyn, obtained an order from Justice Dike in the Supreme Court, directing the Health Department to show cause why a body buried in Most Holy Trinity in Brooklyn on February 18 shall not be disinterred so Mrs. Tamielis may determine whether or not it is that of her husband, Anthony.

The woman has two children, thirteen and eleven years old. Her husband, a snow shoveler, went to work February 8 and did not return. She was told that a man killed by a trolley car early next morning who resembled her husband, had been buried as John Nobrowski by his wife, Clara, Brooklyn, who collected a \$300 insurance policy.

Questioned by police, Mrs. Nabrowski said the man whose body she caused to be buried married her thirty years ago and left her ten years ago. She identified the body on learning of his death. A \$2,000 policy in Mrs. Tamielis' possession is being held up by the insurance company until the case is settled.

RUSSIAN SOVIETS CRUSADE AGAINST VAGRANT CHILDREN

Problem Becomes Difficult
One and Lowers Red
Prestige

MILITIA AND POLICE
ENLISTED IN DRIVE

Many Idiots, Insane and
Other Defectives Found
Among Waifs

LONDON, April 30.—The seriousness of vagrancy among the children in the Soviet Union, and particularly in Moscow, has of late touched the Soviet authorities. It is admitted that the recent reports of Western visitors on this subject were specially considered at a meeting of the People's Commissars, and it was stated that such reports "are doing political harm to the prestige of the Soviet throughout the world."

Mme. Kalenin, the wife of the head of the Soviet Triumvirate, has taken up the matter, and as a first step towards the removal of the children from the streets of Moscow nightly raids are made in the districts where these children are known to seek shelter.

The militia and the railway police have been enlisted for this work, and many foreigners have of late been surprised to see youngsters being chased on the platforms of the Central Rail, assisted by young women wearing red ties or arm bands.

A recent investigation by Dr. Dubrovich has shown that among these vagrant children are a considerable number of insane, idiots and other defectives. There are also many cocaine maniacs and alcoholics, while the mass are neurotics.

SOAKED WITH FILTH

A special group (says Dr. Dubrovich) are soaked with the filth of street life. Their vagrant life has made them the enemies of all organized life. The majority of them are professional thieves, pickpockets, burglars and thieves of goods from moving vehicles. Their faith is expressed in the following motto: "Why should we work hard for five chervonets a month when we can take in one haul 50?" Many of them are intimately connected with the criminal world, with the buyers of stolen goods, and others. A considerable percentage of these have been sniffing cocaine for many years past.

These children need special attention, but, according to this medical authority, the Soviet has not as yet established the numerous institutions necessary for the work. In the whole of the Soviet Union there are not even the necessary institutions for the insane and other defectives. When caught these are herded together with the sane and normal, and naturally do a great

Maple Sugar Yield Lower In Albert Co.

ELGIN, April 30.—The maple sugar season in Albert county is ended and some of the sugar makers have gathered their finds. Weldon Stiles in Mapleton district reports just about one-half a regular season from 1,500 trees tapped. He has had about 700 pounds of sugar, while William Stewart has made 1,000 pounds from around 2,500 trees tapped. R. S. Horsman was the only sugar maker in this vicinity who didn't open his camps this year.

Thunder Fish Reach London Aquarium

Some interesting new arrivals in the London Aquarium are a group of thunder fish from the rivers of north-eastern Europe, says the "London Post." They have received their ominous name from the fact that, when disturbed, they appear to get extremely agitated and to dash themselves about against the rocks with such force and frequency as to make quite a thunderous noise.

They also lose their heads to such an extent, when scared by some unexpected disturbance of their usually peaceful lives, that they do not seem to know where they are going and so "bump" into one another as frequently as into the rocks. Altogether, with the splashing of water and the bumping of their bodies, they have well earned their name of "thunder fish."

They are allied to the cat-fish family, and have similar fleshy barbels, or "whiskers," around their lower jaws. The specimens in the aquarium are small, measuring from eight to ten inches.

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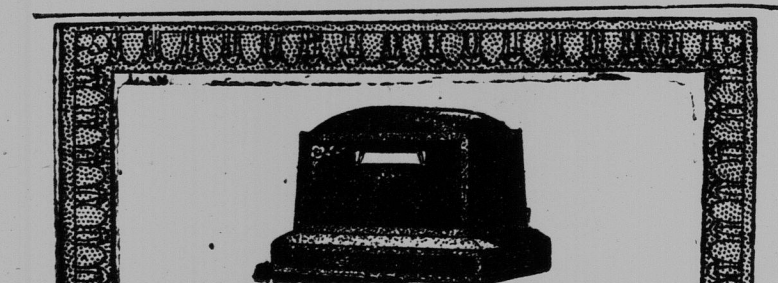
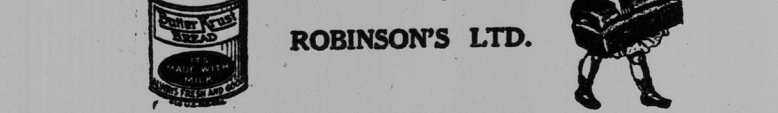
