### PRICES MOVE UP AS WALL STREET OPENS TODAY

Demand for Rail Shares Good; Kansas City Southern Leading

TRADING BRISK IN MONTREAL MARKET

Activities Cover Wide Range With Quotations Generally Higher

NEW YORK, June 28.—Stock prices headed upward as trading was resumed today, but initial gains were only fractional. A moderate demand continued for the rail shares with Kansas City Southern particularly favored because of reports that plans were maturing for the Lorie merger in the south-west. United States Steel, Baldwin, and General Motors were slightly higher, but Hudson, Packard and Union Oil of California were again under pressure.

BRISK IN MONTREAL. MONTREAL, June 28.—Trading on the local stock exchange at the opening this morning was very brisk in a wide range of issues and prices displayed a firm to slightly upward trend. Brazilian, the leader, opened at 97 1/2, up three-eighths, and in subsequent trading touched 97 3/4, for a net gain of seven-eighths for the period. Shawinigan, which has been very active of late, was again in good demand this morning, and scored a half-point gain at 28. Textile was in good demand, but revealed an irregular trend. This issue opened at 46 for a gain of one point, but in later trading it eased back to 44 1/2. The paper issues were quite active. Atchibi, the leader in this

group, lost one point at 78 1/2, while Spanish River and Howard Smith sold unchanged at 100 and 49 1/2 respectively. Other features included Steel of Canada unchanged at 105. Breweries unchanged at 60 and Asbestos preferred, also unchanged at 77.

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### VOTE HERE TIE FOR CHAIRMAN OF PRESBYTERY

Rev. H. A. Goodwin Chosen on Presiding Officer's Word

MEETING HELD IN CENTENARY CHURCH

Standing Committees Selected—Business Topics for This Afternoon

Rev. H. A. Goodwin of this city was elected chairman of the Saint John Presbytery of the United Church of Canada at the forenoon meeting of the annual session held in the hall of Centenary church today. Rev. W. McN. Matthews, of West Saint John, was re-elected secretary and J. Hunter White of this city was chosen treasurer.

VOTE IS TIE. There were two nominations for the office of chairman, the names of Rev. Mr. Goodwin and Rev. Hugh Miller, minister of St. David's church here, being called upon. There was considerable merit in the scrutinizing clerk announced that each had received 14 votes. Rev. Mr. Miller was not present, but friends said that as he already had a great amount of work on his hands he was not willing to accept the chairmanship if elected. The temporary chairman, Rev. Mr. Wightman, of Milltown, thereupon announced that he would give the casting vote in favor of Rev. Mr. Goodwin.

On assuming the chair Rev. Mr. Goodwin thanked the Presbytery for the honor conferred, which he accepted with hesitancy inasmuch as he was not particularly familiar with the duties of the office. The secretary and treasurer also expressed gratitude for the honors conferred on them.

SELECTING LAY MEMBERS. The morning session was mainly occupied in organizing. After the devotional exercises, Rev. William Malcolm of Connecticut was welcomed as a visitor. The roll call led to a somewhat lengthy discussion as to the method of selecting lay members of the Presbytery, several speakers pointing out that the old list was being used, and that the names of several recently elected delegates had not been called. By motions several names of recently elected delegates were substituted for those on the list.

THIS AFTERNOON. After the election of officers, committees were named to select standing committees to introduce new business at the afternoon session. Among the subjects on the agenda, as announced by Secretary Matthews, were the following: Report of congregational statistics, committee on the rearrangement of congregational boundaries in Kings county; report of commissioners to the general conference, proposed religious education conference; home missions, maintenance and sustentation fund.

It was announced that on July 6 the Presbytery of St. Stephen would be formally separated from the Presbytery of Saint John. Today, however, delegates from the St. Stephen Presbytery sat at the sessions here.

Just before the noon recess Hon. J. G. Forbes and T. H. Somerville, presbytery members from the Saint John Presbytery, to the general conference, presented a report on the proceedings of the national body.

Early this afternoon a list of standing committees was presented to the presbytery for adoption.

STATION FLOOR IS COVERED BY MONEY. BOGUS POLICEMAN HOLDS UP OFFICERS. Quincy, Mass., Man Makes Mistake and is Placed Under Arrest. BOSTON, June 28.—A "would-be policeman" picked the wrong men to impose his self-constituted authority on, yesterday, and as a result is now held by the Dorchester police.

About 1:30 a.m. Patrolman Bernard Werners and John G. Werners were on their way home in their car. The brothers had taken off their police hats and coats. On reaching Stoughton street, Dorchester, they found themselves traveling behind a large car.

As the two machines neared Pleasant street, the first car came to a stop and the driver jumped out, came to the Werners' car and played a flashlight in the two Boston policemen's faces. The operator of the first car then showed a badge and said that he was a State officer looking for stolen cars.

Then one of the two who had been held up said, "We are Boston police officers and would like to see that badge again." The other man refused to show his insignia of authority. The Werners then took him to the Fields Corner police station, where it was found that the "police badge" was only that of the shipyard at Fore River and that the wearer was Harold C. Ritchie of Quincy.

He was booked for posing as an officer.

### UNITED BAPTISTS SOUTHERN ASSOC. IN CONVENTION

Three Days' Session at Central Hampstead Concluded Friday

CENTRAL HAMPSHIRE, June 28.—The opening meeting of the sixth annual session of the N. B. United Baptist Southern Association opened on Wednesday evening with Moderator C. T. Clarke in the chair. The association sermon was preached by Rev. J. T. Dimock of Penobscia. His theme was Jesus. Three sessions were held on Thursday, and the following officers were appointed: Rev. W. C. Goucher, D.D., moderator; Rev. J. T. Dimock, vice-moderator; Rev. W. P. Stiles, clerk; Rev. A. L. Telford, assistant clerk. Additional members of the executive, W. J. McAlary, J. A. Vanwart.

The digest of letters as read by the clerk showed a total of 819 members had been added to the church during the year. The sum of \$102,112.18 had been raised, with twenty-five churches yet to be heard from.

Rev. Thomas Marshall, retiring secretary of the N. B. Temperance Alliance, and Rev. Mr. Sutherland, newly appointed secretary, addressed the association in the interests of prohibition.

D. C. Clarke gave a report of the work of the Protestant Orphan Home at Saint John, and made a very earnest appeal for support.

A large number of delegates gathered for the association, and were royally entertained by the people of Central Hampshire and vicinity.
