UNIVERSITY OF ST. JOSEPH'S COLLEGE, New Brunswick, June 15.—The anniversary of the college's founding in 1863 will be celebrated in public in Canada and the United States with the giving of honorary degrees to several prominent men. St. Joseph's University celebrates its diamond jubilee tonight and on Wednesday. The degree-conferring exercises will take place on Wednesday morning, the celebration opening this evening at 8 o'clock with a supper and a welcome to the alumni, many of whom, along with other former students, are expected here for the observance of the jubilee.

The address of welcome will be given by Lionel Landry and J. Arthur Burns, both of whom will give their Bachelor of Arts degree on Wednesday. Messrs. Justices A. T. LeBlanc and J. P. Byrne will reply.

## PLANS MADE FOR DOMINION DAY

Wreath Will be Placed on Sir Leonard Tilley Monument

Band Concerts and Flag Raising Part of Programme for Canada's Birthday.

The placing of a wreath on Sir Leonard Tilley's monument in commemoration of the Fathers of Confederation was decided upon as part of the Dominion Day observance in Saint John at a meeting of the local committee in charge of the arrangements which was held yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms with Lt.-Col. E. C. Weyman, chairman, presiding. Three band concerts in King square are also under consideration as part of the Dominion Day celebrations, and it is hoped to have a choir of school children take part in the programme of the flag raising in King Square.

FLAG RAISING.  
It was reported that everything was in good order for the flag raising and the distribution of flags to school children which will take place simultaneously in four of the city squares, King square, Indian town square, Haymarket square and Court square in West Saint John.

Mrs. Young announced that four of the members of the Women's Council would be on hand, one at each of the four squares, to assist the members of the commemoration committee in distributing flags to school children.

Judge Henderson consented to prepare a sketch of the origin and meaning of Dominion Day, which sketch will be given for publication in the local newspapers on June 30 and July 1.

BAND CONCERTS.  
Commissioners Harding and Bullock and Mr. Machum were appointed a committee to arrange for the three band concerts in King square. It is hoped to have band concerts in the morning, afternoon and evening of Dominion Day in the bandstand in King square the morning concert forming part of the flag raising programme. With reference to the chorus of school children hoped for as part of the King square programme, it was reported that Prof. James F. Browne was endeavoring to complete arrangements but had not done so definitely at that time.

The placing of the wreath on Sir Leonard Tilley's monument was agreed upon by resolution and it was decided to ask His Worship, Mayor Potts, to perform that act.

As Colonel Weyman will be leaving for Sussex shortly, Judge Henderson was appointed to act as chairman of the committee during his absence and the meeting was adjourned to convene again on Monday afternoon, June 29.

LONDON, June 15.—The governments of the British Dominions have been fully advised of all developments regarding the security pact for Western Europe, Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin told a questioner in the House of Commons today.

Asked if the Canadian Premier had not made an announcement regarding the attitude of the Canadian Government toward the proposed pact, Mr. Baldwin answered that he had not seen such an announcement, but he reiterated that Canada had been fully advised of the negotiations.

Mr. Baldwin stated to the House of Commons that he was not sure whether endorsement by the British dominions would be required to make the pact effective.

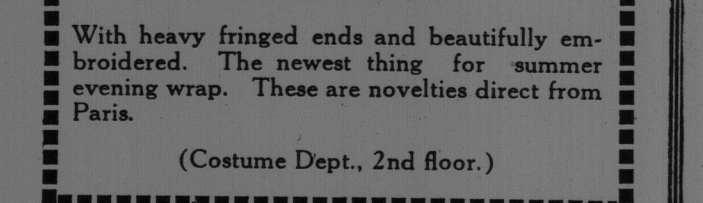

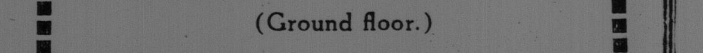
