Opera Musicians, Stage Hands May Join Dressmakers' Strike

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—The costume makers of the Metropolitan Opera House have gone on strike and a sympathetic walkout may be called by the musicians, electricians, stage hands and dressers, all of whom are affiliated with the American Federation of Labor. Boris Drasin, manager of Local 28 of the International Ladies' Garment Workers, said that he would lay this aspect of the strike before the Federation unless a settlement was effected soon.

The striking costume makers number about 25. They walked out on November 4. Several pickets have made their appearance in the vicinity of the Opera House, but there has been no trouble and neither the union officials nor the Opera House management expects any. An investigation by the Federation must be made before the prospective sympathetic strike can be called.

The strike resulted from the recent reorganization of the Metropolitan costume shop, following the engagement of N. E. Lussolotti as head of the workshop and the termination of the

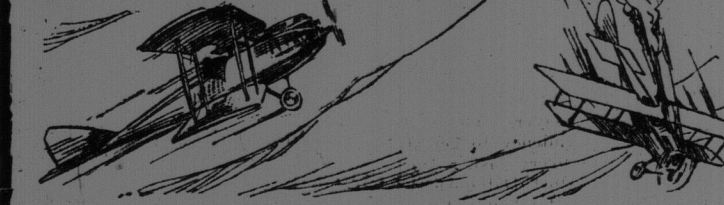

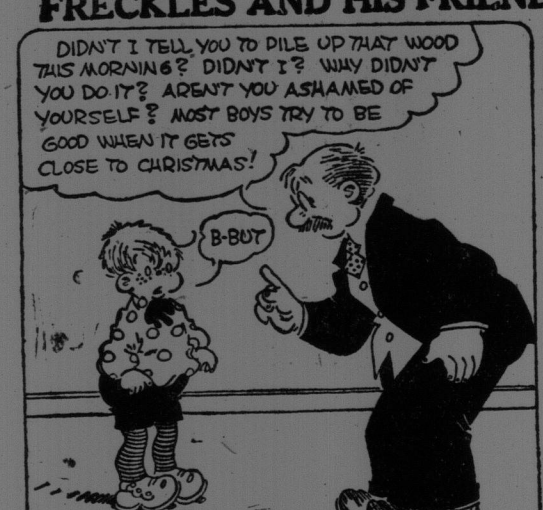
Reds Preach in Vain.
