NEW YORK, Nov, 14—The costume makers of the Metropolitan Opera House have gone on strike and a sympathetic walkout may be called by the musicians, electricians, stage hands and dressers, all of whom are affiliated with the American Federation of Labor. Boris Drasin, manager of Local 38 of the International Ladies' Garment, Workers, said that he would lay this aspect of the strike before the Federation unless a settlement was effected soon.

The striking costume makers number about 25. They walked out on November 4. 


