He said, was made by those who sought assurance. "Find Christ first," declared Dr. Crossley, "and assurance will follow." The fourth blunder of which he spoke was that many did not seek the Lord with their whole heart.

## SAYS NORTH SHORE DISTRICTS THRIVING

Industrial Situation Improves a St. John Man Favorably

A St. John man who returned from a trip to the North Shore recently, says that he was greatly impressed by the favorable industrial situation, particularly in Bathurst and along the Miramichi River. "Busy Bathurst" is what he called the thriving Gloucester wharf town, which, with its big pulp, paper and lumber mills, is rapidly growing and increasing in population. Campbellton is also prosperous, many vessels having loaded there this season and the wharf situation is reported to be very good.

Vessels are still loading in the Miramichi, despite the lateness of the season. The small fishermen along that river are very busy preparing for the coming fishing season which will open legally for netters on Saturday of this week. There is no sign of ice in the river and fishing will be done from scows until the ice forms. Heavy shipments are made annually to the Boston and New York fish commission men. The weather has been fine and generally mild, favoring the work of farmers, many of whom have completed their fall plowing.

In upper Gloucester county the catch of cod and mackerel this year has been heavy and there are no hard times in Shipigan, Carraquet and Miscou, he reports.
