

Induced By Fraud To Marry, He Says

Brings \$100,000 Suit Against
Rich Parents-in-Law.

Boston, June 29.—Sensational allegations surrounding the marriage of Irving S. Richter, wealthy New York trader, and Frances Lumiansky, daughter of Bernard Lumiansky, wealthy New Bedford merchant, are made in suit for \$100,000 filed by Richter against Lumiansky in the United States district court here.

Richter charges Lumiansky, his wife, Annie D. Lumiansky, and his son Harry Lumiansky, with fraudulently inducing him by deceitful and untrue statements to marry Frances, whom it is alleged Lumiansky represented to be "20 years old and truly beautiful."

Richter first became involved in the affair, he says, by answering an advertisement in a New York journal, which read in part, in addition to a description of her youth and beauty: "She finished college and has a nice profession. Thank God, she does not need to work at it, because I am a big business man and none of us wants for anything. She is an exception. Besides her high education, she has musical talent, sings and plays the piano excellently. She is clever, kind-hearted and can be a good housewife and a lovely woman." In return the advertisement demanded a husband of equally good qualifications.

Richter answered the advertisement, and a marriage between him and Frances was arranged and took place Dec. 7, 1920. Afterward Richter asserts he found that the marriage was performed while his wife was absent on leave from the Taunton state asylum, where she had been held as incurably insane. The girl, Richter says, was represented to him as "highly cultured, well trained, decent, respectable, sane, intelligent, virtuous and chaste and of high morals." All of the representations were false, he says.

Prior to his marriage Richter says he was doing a good business in New York under the name Irving Trading Company, and export firm. He also enjoyed the good will and esteem of his business associates, he alleges. By reason of his marriage he has been accused to suffer untold shame, humiliation, degradation, suffering, insults, and mental anguish," he says. His business reputation has from the same cause been lost and destroyed, he further charges.

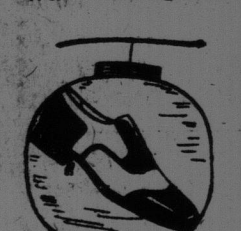

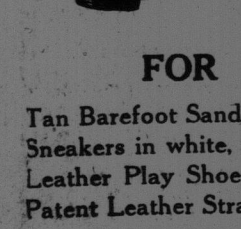

The correct answer to that famous question, an interrogation that has sounded not only in this city but throughout the province, will be known on Saturday night.

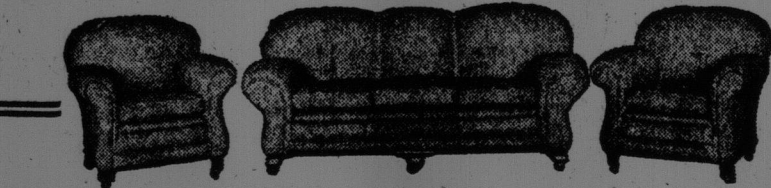
At 10 o'clock tomorrow night, the winner will be named and if present, he or she may take immediate possession of the 1923 five passenger touring car.

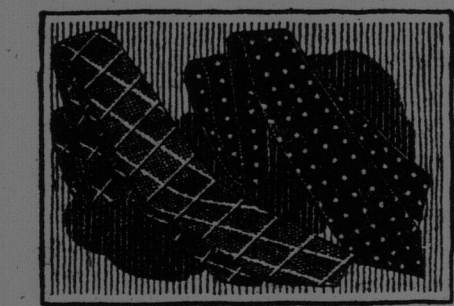
