

ELECTIONS IN SEVERAL TOWNS

St. Andrews, April 14—Today being the last day for nominations for mayor and aldermen for the town of St. Andrews and Mayor Kennedy having resigned, Alderman Dr. J. F. Worrell, who had been chairman of the water committee which installed the new water system and had carried the work to its successful conclusion, was elected as mayor by acclamation. The following were elected as aldermen to assist him in carrying on the town affairs for the coming year: Captain Ranby Wren, Isaac Johnson, F. Howard Greenlaw, W. J. McQuoid, D. Will Mackay, William A. Rhyby, James McDowell, Jr., and R. L. Hivon.

COURTS BLAMED FOR CRIME.

More Criminals Freed in Chicago Than Are Sent to Prison.

Chicago, April 15—Courts are one of the most important factors in the suppression of crime, Henry Barret Chamberlain, director of the Chicago Crime Commission, told the Committee on Law Enforcement of the American Bar Association. He dealt principally with conditions in Chicago.

"Mans are losing their respect for courts," he said. "This is because they hold the bench responsible for the cases which they believe it is expected to correct. In Chicago they know that year less than one out of four of defendants tried for murder in Cook county was convicted, and of the 6,722 defendants actually tried in the criminal courts for felony that only 1,674 paid a penalty. They know that during the same period 388 prisoners were released on the state penitentiary on parole. "The net result shows that 737 convicted of crime were sent to the penitentiary last year from Cook county and that during the same period 998 obtained their freedom in the county by their probation or parole. In other words, the operations of Chicago's legal machinery, controlled by the bench and jury, placed on the streets of Chicago 238 more criminals than the same machinery sent to prison last year. Knowledge of his fact brings dismay to responsible citizens and rejoicing to the hearts of the 'rooks'."

Mr. Chamberlain declared "part of the trouble is the nimbly-pammy, sickeningly intentional outlaws convicted of 'me'."

GORE FOUNDS UNIVERSITY

ian is to Make the Institution a Centre of Oriental Culture

Calcutta, April 15—Sir Rabinradh Tagore, Indian poet, philosopher and poet, who recently returned to his motherland from Europe, has established at Shantiniketan, in the Province of Bengal, a university which promises to become one of the leading centres of Oriental culture. The name of the institution is 'Visva-Bharati' Perishat, and among its objects are to bring together the various cultured cultures of the East and provide for the exchange of knowledge between the East and the West.

In the memorandum of association, provisionally adopted, Tagore is named as the Adhishatya, Acharya (founder-president), to hold office for life or until retirement. The new university has the support of a large body of educated Indians.

BODY OF INFANT FOUND IN PARCEL

Was Left in Check Room of G. T. R. Depot at Hamilton.

Hamilton, Ont., April 13—A bulky parcel, checked at the Stuart street depot of the Grand Trunk on April 1 and not called for, so aroused the suspicions of the check-room supervisor one day this week that he summoned the station-master. When the parcel was opened the dead body of a twelve-pound infant boy was discovered. Life had been extinct for more than a week.

There were no marks of identification on the parcel. Coroner Dr. McIlwraith was notified and the body removed to the City Morgue. It is not thought that an inquest will be held.

WOMEN ON GERMAN BENCH

All Branches of Legal Profession Now Open to Them.

Berlin, April 15—The Reichsrath, or Imperial Council adopted a bill admitting women to all branches of the legal profession, including judgeships and the bar generally, and also to the posts of public prosecutor, attorney and notary public.

Against objections, both psychological and medical, raised in committee against women, the view prevailed that during the war they had shown capabilities entitling them to equal professional competition with men. A Bavarian member, Herr Von Freger, declared that his Government viewed the admission of women into the legal profession as an extremely risky proceeding, and said that the measure, once adopted, would be irrevocable. Therefore he voted against the proposition.

BODY OF AGED FARMER IS FOUND IN RIVER

Quebec, April 15—(Canadian Press)—John O'Neill, aged seventy-one years, a farmer, was found dead in the St. Charles River yesterday. It is thought that he fell from the aqueduct bridge as he was crossing on Thursday night on his way home.

COLLEGE AMALGAMATION?

Halifax, April 14—The Evening Mail published a despatch under a New York date line yesterday to the effect that the amalgamation of the various colleges of the maritime provinces at Halifax was consummated at a meeting of representatives of the colleges to be held in New York. This is denied, however, by officials of Dalhousie University.
