COMMERCIAL CLUB

Matters of Interest Discussed
at Meeting Last Night.

Many matters of live public concern were discussed at a meeting of the Commercial Club last evening in the rooms of the G. W. V. A. W. J. Mahoney, second vice-president, presided. The latter of developing tourist traffic along the St. John river was brought up by Hunter White. H. R. McEldan, secretary, said that the Canada Steamships Ltd., at the instance of Nagle & Vigmore, were looking into the matter of placing boats on the route and also of building hotels.

J. C. Chesley spoke of the regatta to be held by the St. John Power Boat Club on July 1 and said he hoped the people of the city would help make it successful. A. M. Belding spoke of the need of a better service over the Valley Railway and the secretary said that this was being taken up with the C. T. R. P. Regan referred to the visit of American editors here next summer and moved that the executive appoint a social committee to aid in their entertainment.

A. P. Peterson and R. J. Thomson were added as members of the executive. Stanley Elkin, J. A. Tilton and A. Peters were given authority to report for the city from the third Sunday in May to the second Sunday in September was carried.

A spirited discussion took place regarding the matter of sports, there being a report from the sports committee as to its work. Frank Lewis asked why a report was forthcoming and T. P. Regan said there should be some exhibition. A. M. Belding said that there had been only one meeting of the sports team. He thought the club might be of much assistance in connection with the efforts of the Playgrounds Association to have the city fix up athletic grounds near Rockwood Park and in the park of the improvement leagues to have ball teams. H. W. Rising said a provision should be made for St. in taking an active part in hockey and other games and moved that the club take steps towards securing an arena for this city.

QUESTION OF HEAT OF RENTED FLAT IN FREDERICTON

Miss Dora Hanson, in Court,
Says It Is One of Modern
Miracles That She Is Alive.

Fredrickton, N. B., April 10—"It is one of the modern miracles that I am alive today after all I have gone through," declared Miss Dora Hanson, in the York county court yesterday afternoon. She was being cross-examined by C. D. Richards, after having given her evidence in a case she has brought against Mrs. Elizabeth Coburn for \$200 damages because she alleged the defendant failed to heat a flat which she rented from her for a year at \$12 a month heated.

"First of all they tried to freeze me out, then they tried to smoke me out, and when the summer comes I suppose they'll try to heat me out," continued Miss Hanson, unperturbed by attempts of the defendant's solicitor to stop the flow of condemnation of his client. Only because Divine Providence, in whom she said she had never failed to trust, was always on her side was she alive to tell the tale, she said, for she had been ill with bronchitis and not only her "lungs but whole body had been cured."

Mrs. Coburn, a demure little widow with grey, almost white hair, smiled when Miss Hanson told of having been driven from the cellar by the defendant, who she declared was armed with a slab of wood five feet long and four inches thick.

He said that he returned here today and went to the hotel and when he exhibited the money one of the men grabbed it, and the three men ran out of the room, locking the door. He broke down the door, but the men made their escape. With only the description of the men as furnished by Lamy, as a clue, the police began an investigation.

WILL DESTROY OLD PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS

Winnipeg, April 10—Soon after the spring opens up, work of demolishing that famous old land mark, the old parliament buildings, facing Kennedy street, will be started by the department of public works. The government intends to tear down the old structure and proceed with the ground plan scheme which, when completed, will make the new capitol a jewel set in a ring of green lawns and shade trees, flanked with curving driveways.

Cannon Ball in Tree.
Vancouver, B. C., April 10—An old fashioned cannon ball, of the 25 lb. variety, used many years ago on this coast by the admiralty ships, caused the False Creek Lumber Company a loss of \$250 the other day. It was embedded in the centre of a huge log cut at Duncan Bay. The tree had grown around the ball and concealed it so well that it was not discovered until the saw struck it. The missile must have been discharged many years ago by a passing warship.

WINNIPEG STREET RAILWAY MEN ARE SEEKING MORE PAY

Winnipeg, April 10—Winnipeg Electric Railway Company street car men are asking for wage increases estimated to amount to \$600,000 yearly. It is said the motormen and conductors want an increase of twenty-five to thirty-five cents an hour as a maximum rate. This would mean from eighty cents to ninety cents an hour.

Chinese Labor Suggested.
Moose Jaw, Sask., April 10—The possibility of introducing Oriental labor into Saskatchewan to replace the unskilled foreign labor which is withdrawing from the country, is the subject of a communication from the Weyburn Board of Trade. The proposal is not set out in detail but is assumed here that it will provide for a system of importing Chinese labor under contract which will keep it under proper supervision until the time arrives for its return to China much in the same manner as was done in South Africa.

Graphic: The past season has been a record-breaker in the lumber business on the Restigouche and it is estimated that the cut is about fifty per cent larger than any previous year. The heavy snow storms during the latter part of January and in February delayed hauling to the landings, and now the breaking up of the hauling roads has made it impossible to get all the logs to the bows, so a large quantity will remain for another year. However, if the drives come out there will be logs enough to keep all the mills busy.
