## CHIEF BENDER GOES TO N. Y. AMERICANS

Pat McDonald Claims New Record for Throwing 35 lb. Weight.

New York, May 31.—Chief Bender, veteran Indian pitcher, has been purchased by the New York Americans from the Philadelphia Nationals for the sum of \$10,000.

Bender has been a hold-out this spring.

A new world record in the thirty-five pound weight event was claimed today by Pat McDonald, unmatched, who yesterday heaved the iron ball 68 feet 10 inches at the Irish-American Athletic Club's Sheridan memorial meet at Celtic Park. The old record was 57 feet 7 inches, made by Pat Ryan on Sept. 1, 1915.

## SUMMER ACTIVITIES OF THE BANGOR Y.W.C.A.

Summer activities for girls which are being arranged by the Young Women's Christian Association are meeting with favor among the young ladies and a most successful summer is being anticipated. The garden club is proving most popular, fifty girls having already registered.

A company of girl scouts is being formed under the supervision of Miss Bernice Smith, the girls' secretary of the Y. W. C. A. This organization is meeting with much success in larger cities and there seems to be no doubt that Bangor can come up to the standard. The rules, regulations and purpose of this organization were explained Tuesday before the girls of the Hannibal Hamlin school and they were told that registration could be made after school hours and all questions answered at the Y. W. C. A. rooms. After school hours forty-two girls representing the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades registered, this making a splendid beginning. Miss Smith will visit the other schools in the near future and it is hoped that the girls will consider this matter and make Bangor's company of girl scouts the largest yet.

Summer sports, including tennis, swimming, track athletics, bicycle and camera races, have been arranged for girls over ten years of age. The Blue Bird Club includes girls under ten years. To join these clubs it is not necessary to be a girl scout, there are no fees connected, just splendid recreation.

In regard to the garden clubs one must be a member of the Young Women's Christian Association before being allowed to join the club. Each year the girls will meet at the Y. W. C. A. rooms and start off with their leader, Miss Smith. Friday will be the last day of registration.

Arrangements are being made for a field day to be held Saturday, June 1. All Bangor girls and young women interested in the summer activities are cordially invited. The time and place will be announced shortly.

The Y. W. C. A. is also arranging for outings for young business women who have Saturday afternoons off, complete details of which will be given in the near future. The tennis courts will be open two evenings during the week for girls who have not the opportunity to use them during the day.

Excellent work is being done for the girls of this city by the Y. W. C. A. and much credit is due them for their splendid efforts. All girls are invited to join these different clubs which will afford much pleasure for them during the summer.

## TO DISCUSS PLANS FOR GETTING MORE ST. LOUIS PLAYERS

Directors of the St. Louis National League club will meet today to discuss plans for raising \$50,000 for the purchase of the players in an effort to put the Cardinals out of a slump.

One of the plans suggested, it is understood, provides for the assessment of twenty-five of the stockholders \$500 each.

Members of the board denied rumors that Rogers Hornsby, creek shortstop, would be sold to raise money to bolster up the club. W. C. Anderson, one of the directors, said the team would retain Hornsby as long as there was a dollar left in the treasury.

## SOLDIER WAS WEDDED WITHOUT HIS KNOWLEDGE

A queer story of adventure was told by a soldier named John Lewis when charged at West Ham, London, with embezzling £7 odd.

He denied the charge and said that last August he went to pay over the money, but there was no one to receive it. Then he was knocked down by a van and taken to West Ham Hospital. He remembers nothing else till December when he "came to his senses" after a bomb dropped near him in a London district. He then made his way to his home at Cardiff, where his mother introduced him to a young lady and said she was his wife. He refused to believe it, but was shown the marriage certificate, which stated that he was married at St. Alban's, Holborn, on December 15, 1917.

The clerk of the court said there was no record at West Ham Hospital of Lewis' admission, but he had described exactly to the police the room into which he was taken, and he was treated, and the doctor who attended him.

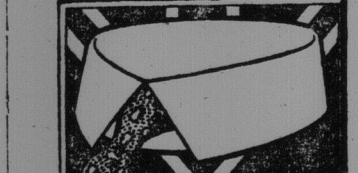
In answer to the magistrate Lewis gave the name of the port at which he landed each time he went to France, the name of his regiment, and his regimental number. He also said he had been twice wounded, but his papers had been lost in the bomb explosion.

When he was bound over, Lewis was removed from the dock in a fainting condition.
