The market made fractional improvement after the decline of the 16th hour, but developed greater heaviness later, fresh selling being induced by war bulletins. Sumatra tobacco, which was second to U. S. Steel in activity, increased its loss to eight points. Leading industrial, including the steel, also declined. Locomotive and General Motors were under further pressure. Minor metals were an exception to the general trend, American Zinc and Butte and Superior gaining one and two points respectively.

Amsterdam, July 17.—The Austro-Hungarian government regarded the war as "senseless and purposeless bloodshed" and believes it might be ended at the moment when the Allies again manifest feelings of humanity, Baron Burian, Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, made this statement in a speech to the Austrian and Hungarian premiers on Tuesday, according to despatches from Vienna. After declaring that the Allies would not succeed in their purpose of sowing discord among the nationalities in the dual monarchy, the foreign minister said:

"It is unnecessary further to characterize this method of fighting. Our races indignantly disavow it. The result of a battle of defence must now be carried on to a good end until it brings us the security necessary for our future peaceful existence."

SYNDICATE TAKES \$900,000 OF MONTREAL-PROTESTANT SCHOOL SECURITIES

Montreal, July 17.—The Protestant board of school commissioners in this city have, it is understood, accepted the offer of a syndicate composed of C. Meredith & Company, Ltd., Hanson Bros., and A. E. Jones & Company for an issue of \$900,000 six per cent bonds of varying maturities. The syndicate bid \$9.00 for the whole issue, a price equivalent to about a 6 1/2 per cent rate.

CALLS ON GERMANY TO WITHDRAW FROM BELGIUM

London, July 17.—German newspapers give prominence to an interesting statement on Belgium by Prof. Hans Delbrueck in the News-Watcher Journal. The Belgians are reported to have been asked to withdraw from Belgium without conditions and to re-instate their independence and integrity. Germany has plenty of other safeguards. Belgium is not only a German question, it is a world question.

FOUR POLICE WOMEN ADDED TO THE MONTREAL FORCE

Montreal, July 17.—Director of Public Safety, Joseph Tremblay, last night announced the appointment of four police-women—two French and two English speaking—to the Montreal police force. They will wear no distinctive uniforms, but will have a badge. They are given the power of constables and start at a constable's salary of \$400 per annum.

RUSSIAN AFFAIRS

Peking, Monday, July 15.—The town of Khatsherek, in the southwestern Szechuan province, has been occupied by the Czechoslovak forces, following their capture of Irukak. The Bolsheviks are reported concentrating at Verendinsk.

Peking, Monday, July 16.—A despatch from Manchuria announces that General Semenov, the anti-Bolshevik leader, has occupied Sharsui with his forces.

Washington, July 17.—General Pershing's communique for Monday reported that 200 prisoners were taken by the Americans in their counter-attack which drove the Germans back to the Marne east of Chateau Thierry. In the Vosges five trench raids attempted by the enemy were broken down under American fire.

Much Damage by Typhoid. Osaka, Japan, July 17.—A violent typhoid epidemic is raging in Osaka and the Luchu Islands on the night of July 17. Much damage was done to railway lines and telegraph lines. Floods occurred in Kobe and Osaka.
