STRIKERS NUMBER 250,000 TO 400,000 Belgium Comparatively Quiet in Spite of Stoppage of Work—Coal Shortage Soon is Felt

BALKAN WAR IS AT LAST ENDED

TOKYO, Japan, April 16.—It is officially announced that arrangements have been concluded for the issue of a Japanese loan of \$35,000,000 at five per cent. in Paris. Thirty-five million dollars is to be allotted to the redemption of railroad bonds.
